The material for each exam is subject to change according to the pace of lectures throughout the semester. No exam grades will be dropped, and there will be no do-overs. However, if homework grade is 85% or higher AND you have fewer than three excused absences, the lowest exam score will be replaced with your score on the cumulative final exam.

If you missed more than four class periods, you will not be allowed to take any exam

Quiz/ Class Activities: There will be quizzes periodically throughout the semester. Quizzes are to be done on your own. Most quiz problems will be similar to problems worked in class or in the homework. There will also be in-class Activities (no make-up class activities). Worth 10%

Exam make-up policy: If you miss an exam, you will be expected to show appropriate cause in writing. If you miss an exam and have not contacted me within 24 hours, you forfeit your right to a make-up.

Academic Honesty policy: You may work together on homework assignments and you may consult whatever sources you deem necessary while doing so as long as you do not perform plagiarism. The purpose of the homework is to LEARN-specifically, to better your understanding of the underlying concepts and to gain proficiency in using them to solve problems.

Quizzes and Exams, on the other hand, exist for you to DEMONSTRATE what you have learned. They are individual endeavors, where no help is to be given or received. Cheating on a quiz or exam includes, but is not limited to, sharing answers or using any form of cheat sheet (note: notes programmed into a calculator count as a cheat sheet). If I catch you cheating on a quiz or exam, I will forbid you from attending any further class meetings and assign you a grade of F in the course. You may also be referred to the dean on academic dishonesty charges.

Attendance Policy: Attendance is expected in every class. If you miss a class, then you are expected to get notes from a classmate. **I expect you to arrive to class on time.**

Classroom Rules of Conduct: Students must refrain from behavior in class that disrupts the learning process. Addendum: Use of Telephones and Text Messagers in Academic Classrooms and Facilities

The present policy does not specify particular devices or device types. Instead, this policy applies to any device that performs the function of a telephone or text messager.

- No telephone conversations shall be conducted during class
- Any use of a telephone or text messager or any device that performs these functions during an exam or quiz is prohibited. These devices should not be present during an exam or quiz and should be stored securely in such a way that they cannot be seen or used by the student. Even the visible presence of such a device during an exam period or quiz will result in a grade of zero points for that exam or quiz. Use of these devices during an exam or quiz is considered de facto evidence of cheating and could result in a charge of academic dishonesty. SHSU Academic Policy Statement 100728 states that

- even the visible presence of such a device during the test period will result in a zero for that test. Use of these devices during a test is considered de facto evidence of cheating and could result in a charge of academic dishonesty.
- In the case of a personal emergency, students should leave the classroom in order to conduct any telephone conversation.
