COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Evaluate characteristics and ethical responsibilities of leaders
- 2. Discuss the theories and principles of different leadership styles
- 3. Demonstrate knowledge of different leadership theories
- 4. Analyze the styles, roles of a leadership and bases of power
- 5. Assess and reflect upon personal leadership abilities and skills
- 6. Apply appropriate style of leadership to situation
- 7. Analyze methods of change in communities and organizations
- 8. Evaluate and develop new leadership and motivation skills
- 9. Develop leadership potential and utilize effective leadership in dealing with people and organizations

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

The student is expected to participate in class activities and discussion. All class members will be expected to participate in their work groups and in the presentations. Each group will present their research articles to the class on their assigned date. The group presentation should include a polished power point presentation, group paper, class activity with questions and answers given by work groups. This is a large class so everyone must be prepared to present on assigned dates.

POLICY CONCERNING LATE ASSIGNMENTS AND MISSED EXAMS

There will be in class quizzes totaling 200 pts, a group project 200 pts, a midterm exam and final exam (both essay) 250pts each, it would be a rare exception that a student could make up a missed exam. If for some very good reason you cannot take exam on given date contact me for arrangements. Real life emergencies will always be given consideration. I cannot accept late papers.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

I am required to record attendance. Students are asked to sign-in for each class, if you do not sign-in you are considered absent. It will affect your grade if you miss required material or an in class quiz or presentations. I expect everyone to treat each other and myself with respect as I will always treat you with respect. We want as little distractions as possible. Please if you must respond to your phone do so outside the classroom. Your participation in group work is the key to your success in this class. Everyone must attend group presentations.

GRADES AND ASSIGNMENTS:

The class will be broken into cooperative work groups. Each work group will present their assigned journal articles to the class and lead discussion on their assigned date. I will give quizzes randomly with random values. The midterm and final exam will consist of 12 essay questions. The class will be required to read twenty journal articles from the leadership literature. Every work group will be assigned a leadership topic to present to the class. It would be prudent to make backup copies of all assignments

Use level 3 APA headings to arrange your topics or sections. Every assignment should include a title centered on the first page.

CLASS STRUCTURE:

Tuesday classes will involve lecture and new material, Thursday classes will typically include class presentations, Q&A by assigned groups, and some new material.

Quizzes can be given on any day. The midterm and final will consist of twelve questions to be answered in class. All are essay questions that must be answered completely. Any paper to me should be typed in **Arial font #12** the midterm and final should **not be over twelve pages**. Your MT and final will be written in an assigned computer lab on the assigned day.
