**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** This course will closely examine the major figures in English literature from 1798 to the present. The purpose of this class is to offer you the opportunity to read, analyze, and discuss a representative selection of English literature from the Romantics to the present, with particular attention to the relationship of the literature to its social, political, and intellectual contexts. This class will provide the foundation you will need for further analysis of both canonical and non-canonical literature. Most importantly, I hope to stimulate a love for and an appreciation of good literature.

### **COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

Students will be able to

- 1. Discuss the social, political, and intellectual contexts of major works in English literature from 1798 to the present.
- 2. Provide textual support for their analysis of texts.
- 3. Write analysis of literary texts.
- 4. Understand various movements in English literature.

# **REQUIRED TEXTS:**

Norton Anthology of English Literature, Vol. 2 Shelley, Mary. Frankenstein (Bantam Classic with an introduction by Diane Johnson) Forster, E. M. A Passage to India

#### **REQUIREMENTS FOR THE COURSE:**

<u>Midterm and Final</u>—You will take two exams, which will consist of an in-class essay and an objective short-answer section.

<u>Paper</u>—You will write a 7-10-page paper (typed, double-space, 1-inch margins, no extra spaces, MLA style). This paper will be over the novel *Frankenstein*. You will need a minimum of 3 scholarly sources. These must be from scholarly journals (these journals may be online).

<u>Annotated Bibliography</u>—You will create an annotated bibliography of at least 8 scholarly sources on *Frankenstein*. Please find your sources using the MLA Bibliography.

<u>Prospectus</u>—You will develop a prospectus for your paper. It will consist of your introduction and thesis statement, a review of the literature on the topic you've chosen, and your main arguments.

<u>Presentation</u>—You will be placed in a group to present on *A Passage to India*. Details on the presentation will be given to you at a later date.

<u>2 Frankenstein events</u>—You will need to attend 2 Frankenstein events, sign in, and write a one-page summary of the experience.
