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TEXTBOOK: Introductory Mathematical Analysis for Business, Economics and the life and social Sciences, Thirteenth edition by Haeussler, Paul, and Wood

Calculator: TI-83 or better recommended.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: The primary objective of this course is to give you a foundation in mathematics you will need in your higher level business courses. While this course will focus on concepts that will be most useful in business focused calculus courses, other topics will also be covered. A successful student will be able to....

- Solve equations through the consistent and correct application of algebraic operations
- Use function notation and recognize the notion of fundamental mathematical concept,
- Work with function composition
- Recognize the shapes of the graphs of, and be able to compute with, polynomials, rational functions, exponentials, and logs
- Identify one to one and onto functions and be able to compute inverses, and
- Work with basic financial formulas.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: Topics include a review of introductory algebra, equations,

relations, functions, graphs, linear programming, systems and equations and matrices, and mathematics of finance.

GRADING POLICY

QUIZZES: Every Week there is a short quiz based on on previous homework. The quizzes will be closed book and closed notes. There will be no make-up quizzes. The lowest one quiz grade will be dropped.

ACTIVE LEARNING & HOMEWORK: Students are asked to read the textbook and try and do the assigned problems prior to the class. Every Friday random students has to go to the board and explain what they understood about the homework problems. Based on his written work and explanations, points will be added and if the called student is not present, no marks will be given.

Please Note- You are highly encouraged to work as groups, get help from your classmates to do your homework, even use their work as a reference but expect to write the answer in your own words, refer online sources but you have to understand the concepts and not allowed to copy it as it is. Also you have to mention your reference. Your understanding will be evaluated when you ask to explain the problems in front of the class. Also helping your classmates are highly appreciated. EXAMS: Many exam problems will be similar to Homework problems, Quiz problems or worked examples in the class.

If you arrive late to an exam, you may still take the exam in the remaining time as long as no body has finished the exam yet.
