Course Description: This course is an introduction to the basic elements of sociology and society. This course includes understanding the sociological view, examining social groups and institutions, and critically analyzing various components of society and how they interact with one another. This course is designed to introduce you to the field of sociology, engage critically with the text and real-world scenarios, and to develop learning skills that are applicable to various disciplines.

Course Outcomes: After completing this course, you should be able to:

- Recall basic sociological principles, concepts and issues
- Explain how ideas, values and cultural beliefs generate distinctive aesthetic and intellectual creations;
- Analyze course material to contemporary events and trends in local, regional, national and global communities

Skill Goals:

- Think critically about current events in an increasingly diverse U.S. society;
- Reflect on and express your own culture, values, ideas and personal and social responsibilities as a member of our multicultural society;
- Communicate intercultural competence, understanding, and interaction orally and in writing.

Course Objectives:

- Gain *factual knowledge* pertaining to topics using a sociological lens,
- *Develop* and *Understand* various resources available and how to use them in understanding and conversing about real world topics, and
- Learn how to *apply* course material to "real life" data in hands-on experiences.

Assessments and Grade Calculations:

- Due dates for assignments are listed in the course calendar in this syllabus; **NO makeup tests or quizzes will be given**, unless an authorized note from a doctor is provided-in this case, you will have one week from that date to complete the makeup assignment.
- Attendance will be taken at the beginning of every class meeting, except for review days and test days. At the beginning of class, I will place a question pertaining to the day's reading on the board, you will have approximately 5 minutes to answer the question on a note card, which you will turn in once the time has expired. If you arrive more than 10 minutes after the start of class, you will be counted absent. If you leave more than 10 minutes before the end of class, you will be counted absent. Documentation is required for an absence to be excused or to make-up exams. The point system for attendance is as follows:
 - 3 points for correct answers
 - 1 point for partial answer/writing your name
 - 0 points for no card
- A study guide for the tests will be provided one week prior to the test; there are no study guides for the quizzes.

Additional Resources/Blackboard: Blackboard is the main platform for which I will post assessments, quizzes, study guides, additional readings, and further information about the course. I will communicate via Blackboard and your university email, not personal email. *It is highly*

recommended that you check your BB account and email at least once a week in order to be well-informed of current communication within the course.

Journals: Responses should be ³/₄ to 1 full-page length. A paragraph is 5-7 sentences. Journals will not be graded on formatting – such as spelling or syntax, or whether they are 'right' or 'wrong' in terms of response. They are an opportunity for you to connect what you are learning in class to real world experiences; to see sociology in action. The goal for journals should be to synthesize information learned in the course with real world experience. Journals will be typed and brought to class on the due date, and turned in at the beginning of class. **NO** late submissions will be accepted; submissions after the deadline will be considered late and will result in a grade of zero (0).

Quizzes: These consist of 10 multiple-choice questions, and will be administered online via Blackboard (BB). You will have 15 minutes to take the quiz. They will draw on information from class meetings, the text, and additional materials used during the course. *Quizzes are <u>NOT</u> open note/open book....or open student.**

Tests: These consist of 50 questions, multiple-choice answer, or true/false. Tests are offered online and in class, and you will have 80 minutes to complete them – whether in class or online. If you decide to take the test in-class, rather than online, a scantron (882-E) will be required and they can be purchased from the university bookstores. You **MUST** bring a pencil and scantron to the test; these will not be provided for you. If you do not have a scantron, you will not be allowed to take the test and a grade of zero (0) will be applied. Tests will be administered at the beginning of the class meeting time allotted for your class and section. If you arrive to class on a test day after the tests have been administered, you will not be able to take the test. *Cell phones and other computer devices are NOT ALLOWED during an exam*. Proctor Free is an official proctoring software that will be used in this course. It monitors the exam in order to deter cheating. A practice quiz will be given at the beginning of the semester in order for students to set up their profiles. There is no final exam for this course.*

I employ various mechanisms to deter cheating; any suspicious activity will be considered cheating and therefore will result in a grade of zero (0).

Course Policies

Make-Up Policy: Due dates for assignments are listed in the course calendar in this syllabus. If an authorized note is provided, then you have one week to complete the missed assignment upon submitting the note. If you have missed any assignment and do not have an authorized note, you will have an opportunity to complete all missed assignments on the last day of class. This entails you completing ALL missed assignments during the time allotted for the class period. For example, if you miss 1 test, 1 quiz, and 1 journal assignment, you will have the time allotted for your class to complete the 3 assignments. I reserve the right to produce a different assignment or assessment than the original one. For example, if you miss a test, I reserve the right to administer a makeup exam of essay questions, instead of the original 50 multiple choice questions.

Academic Dishonesty: I have a zero tolerance policy for plagiarism and cheating; in the case of plagiarism or cheating I reserve the right to provide a grade of zero (0) for that assignment. All students are expected to engage in all academic pursuits in a manner that is above reproach.
