Course Policies:

Policy governing electronic devices: Cell phones must be turned off during class. Textmessaging is prohibited. Laptops may be used in the classroom for note-taking only. By doing so, we become more articulate, sophisticated users of the English language. As a result, we will be able to communicate our ideas more forcefully and precisely.
