# Econometrics for Business (Econ4362.01) Spring 2018

#### **Course Description**

This course focuses on the process of gathering and analyzing nonexperimental economic data. Cross-sectional, time series, and panel data will be analyzed using multiple regression techniques and results will be interpreted within an economics framework.

# **Learning objectives**

In this course, the student will learn to:

- Understand types of data and be able to prepare data for analysis
- Understand regression analysis, perform tests on regression results, and interpret statistical significance
- Perform regression analysis using Excel
- Effectively communicate the results of data analysis

## **Evaluation**

**Midterms and Final:** There will be <u>no make-up exams without exceptions</u>. Midterms will be taken only during regular class time. If you miss midterms for any emergencies (accidents, death of family members, surgery etc), the grade from your final might be reweighted to account for the missed exam. In this case, solid documentation should be provided. If you miss an exam without a valid excuse you will get a grade of ZERO.

If you miss all midterms, you will get an F in this course.

<u>The final examination cannot be missed under any circumstances</u> and should be taken during the final examination schedule set by the university. The exams will be closed book.

\*\* No student will be allowed to enter the classroom and begin the exam after the first student who finishes leaves the room.

**Calculator:** You are allowed to bring a calculator for all exams. However, calculators built into cell phones, PDAs, or other electronic devices are not allowed. Calculators cannot be shared during exams.

**Re-grading:** If you believe that there is a mistake in your grade, you can make a request to re-grade the e xam/homework no later than a week after receiving your exam/HW. The entire exam/HW will be regraded and there's always a chance that your grade might go down.

**Curve:** It is the instructor's right to decide to curve the grade or not. The curve (if there is one) will depend on the final class average and will only be determined at the end of the semester once all grades are in and I can compute the final average.

**Attendance**: Attendance will be taken each class. <u>You'll be considered absent from a class session if you are not in attendance when the class starts, if you are not present when the roll is taken or if you leave without permission before the class is dismissed.</u>

**Use of Telephones and Text Messagers**: The use by students of electronic devices that perform the function of a telephone or text messager during class-time may be prohibited if deemed disruptive by the instructor to the conduct of the class. Arrangements for handling potential emergency situations may be granted at the discretion of the instructor. Failure to comply with the instructor's policy could result in expulsion from the classroom or with multiple offenses, failure of the course. Any use of a telephone or text messager or any device that performs these functions during a test period is prohibited. These devices should not be present during a test or should be stored securely in such a way that they cannot be seen or used by the student. **Even the visible presence of such a device during the test period will result in a zero for that test**. Use of these devices during a test is considered de facto evidence of cheating and could result in a charge of academic dishonesty.

\*\* This course has a zero tolerance policy for cheating. Any student found cheating will receive an F in the course and be directed to the appropriate University authorities.

### **Student Absences on Religious Holy Days Policy**

Section 51.911(b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose. Section 51.911 (a) (2) defines a religious holy day as: "a holy day observed by a religion whose places of worship are exempt from property taxation under Section 11.20...." A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence. University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s). The instructor will complete a form notifying the student of a reasonable timeframe in which the missed assignments and/or examinations are to be completed.
