Course Description: Problems of unemployment, wage theory, collective bargaining, labor legislation, and proposals for the solution of labor problems. The recent problems of labor are given special consideration.

Course Objectives: Upon completion of this course, you will be have developed an understanding of the workings of labor markets and their interaction with business and political institutions. You will be able to

- describe how incentives for workers and for firms affect labor market outcomes.
- analyze how public policy influences labor market outcomes,
- use economic models to describe the decisions made by labor market participants.
