

**SOCI 2319: Introduction to Ethnic Studies (3 Credit Hours)**

**Course Description:** This course is designed as a philosophical analysis of the issues of race, gender, class, and culture. Unlike what my colleagues in ethnic studies or anthropology might examine related to these issues, as a philosopher I am concerned with the epistemological and normative concepts and principles that undergird them. We can get at these concepts and principles through two methods: first, through the analysis of empirical data and historical records; second, through conceptual reflection. We will use both methods in this course. This course is taught with the expectation that few if any of you will work as academics in the future. As such, my hope is that you gain the necessary skills and knowledge-base transferable to whatever it is you one day do as a vocation. Also, I hope the course provides depth to your thinking and self-reflection, and contributes to your personal interactions with others.

**Course Objectives:**

1. Introduce the histories and key concepts of the different racial and ethnic groups that constitute the melting pot of America.
2. Discuss how race and ethnicity can intersect with other differences such as gender, class, education, and wealth
3. Explain the social construct of these differences
4. Reflect, think critically, and discuss these important issues

**Text:** *Race, Ethnicity, Gender, and Class* (7th edition) by Joseph F. Healey

**Course Format:** This is an Internet online course. All information as well as activities will be posted on blackboard for course number SOC 2319.

**Course Requirements:** Students are expected to complete assigned readings weekly in order to successfully complete weekly quizzes and discussions. In addition, I will post notes for each chapter as well as study tools for the tests. There will also be some supplemental videos posted as part of the discussion forum.

**Reading Assignments:** Quizzes and discussions will require that you have done the assigned reading prior to taking the quizzes or participating in the discussions. You will not be able to fully engage in the discussions otherwise.

**Exams:** There will be FOUR non-cumulative exams in the course. They will include all the readings, lectures, discussions, and films up to the point of the exam. They will be 50 multiple choice and true/false questions.

**Test 1 Sun 2/18-Mon 2/19, Test 2 Sun 3/11-Mon 3/12, Test 3 Sun. 4/15 to Monday 4/16, Test 4 Sun 5/6 to Mon 5/7.**

These are not comprehensive exams. Scheduling of academic or non-academic activities during any of the exam periods will be considered an insufficient reason for granting a make-up exam.

**You will have between 8:00 a.m. on the first day until 10:00 p.m. on the second day to take the exam. You will have only 90 minutes to complete each exam. The exams are open-note exams but you must complete the exam in 90 minutes or you will be penalized 2 points for each minute past 90 minutes.**

You can only take each exam once so be sure to answer all of the exam questions before you submit the exam. Also be sure to have a secure Internet connection. Dial-up phone line connections are not secure and tend to kick you off the Internet. In the event that a student cannot take one of the exams at the regularly scheduled time, s/he must notify Professor Nguyen prior to the scheduled exam to make arrangements for a make-up exam. Students must provide verifiable documentation to justify their absence from the exam.

**Quizzes:** On a regular week that has no testing, there will be a quiz opened on Sunday at 8:00 and will close on Monday at 10:00 PM. You would need to have done the assigned reading prior to taking the quiz. There are 10 multiple choice or True/False questions on a quiz and you will have 15 minutes to complete them. Each quiz will be worth 5 points.

**Discussions:** There will be five discussion forums. Each discussion is worth 10 points. The discussion weeks are posted below on the schedule. There will be a rubric provided to allow you know what will get you full credit for the discussion. If there is a discussion for the week, I will post it on Wednesday. An original post is expected by 10pm on the Saturday once a discussion is opened. A reply to a peer's discussion is also expected of you by 10pm on Tuesday. In order to participate fully in the discussion, students will need to be familiar with the readings/notes prior to participating. Below is grading criteria:
