# ASSIGNMENTS

**Weekly Course Review Wiki & Quizzes:** Using the <u>Wiki function in Bb</u>, we will complete weekly reviews of the course material. You will be randomly assigned to one of two groups. I will post approximately 20 questions each week that cover readings. Students will work with their groups to complete the weekly review. In order to receive full credit for the assignment, students must <u>answer at least one question</u> <u>each week</u>. A more detailed description of the assignment will be posted on Bb.

**Weekly Discussion:** Students will participate in weekly discussions using the Bb discussion forums. Student participation will be based on the quantity (at least three comments per week) and quality (comments should be related to the course material and flow with the discussion) of their posts.
