COURSE DESCRIPTION: The course is a survey of the modern-day stressors and the scientific consideration dealing with these stressors. The general areas explored include such topics as technology, interpersonal relationships, sexuality, culture differences, intimate relationships, etc.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- Demonstrate through test scores and class discussions an understanding of the general concepts and theories regarding adjustment issues facing people today.
- Have a working understanding of the theories and application through test scores and class discussions.

REQUIRED TEXT: PSYCHOLOGY APPLIED TO MODERN LIFE, Twelfth Edition, Authors – Weiten, Lloyd, Dunn, Hammer, Publisher: Wadsworth Cengage Learning

ATTENDANCE POLICY: Attendance requirements will follow those of SHSU, and if other absences are required the matter is to be discussed with Dr. Boyle, either in advance, or as soon after the absence as possible.

CELL PHONE AND OTHER ELOCTRONIC DEVICE USAGE: The policy for usage of these devices is strictly forbidden. This includes cell phone calls, text messaging, I-Pods, and laptop computers for any other use than to take notes in class. Turns phones off before class, or put them on silence or vibrate. No electronic devices will be allowed during tests.

EXAMS: 4 exams will be given and each will be an objective, multiple-choice format on a Scantron sheet provided by the student. The questions will be taken from the text as well as from class lectures. If a test is missed a grade of 0 will be given. If a test is missed for a legitimate emergency (illness, etc.) and the instructor is immediately notified arrangements can be made for a makeup exam. If schedule conflicts arise inform the instructor prior to the exam date.

GRADING PLAN: A number grade of 0 to 100 will be given for each test. The final grade will be the average of the 4 test scores. The grade for each test as well as the final grade (the average of the 4 test scores) will be determined by a 10% cut off:

90 to 100 = A 80 to 89 = B 70 to 79 = C 60 to 60 = D 59 and below = F.

The grade earned on each test as well as the final grade will be posted on Blackboard within two days of the completion of the examination.

EXTRA CREDIT: Extra credit opportunities will be offered by participating in research projects found in PeRP on the SHSU Psychology webpage. The student will earn 3 points per project and will be allowed to complete up to three for a possible total of 9 points. The extra credit points will be added to total points and the average calculated as described above.
