*In order to meet American Music Therapy Association (AMTA) standards, music therapy students are expected to obtain a grade of C or better in all core music therapy courses, including this one.

*Students who cannot complete course requirements will receive a grade of F. Exceptions may be granted and incomplete (X) grades given with proper documentation in the case of severe health emergencies or death in the immediate family. Grades will be posted using the university system by the date specified in the university class schedule. Students may review or discuss grades with the instructor throughout the semester.

Course Policies:

Attendance Policy: Regular attendance is expected of all students. Assignments or performances due during one's absence should be discussed the instructor as early as possible to schedule an acceptable solution. Follow professional job procedures.

All absences must be documented prior to class (when feasible) by means of a phone call or email to the instructor. Leave a message on voicemail, if necessary. Please understand that this documentation does not by any means guarantee an excused absence, but without such notification, a written doctor's notice, or a funeral notice, all absences will be considered unexcused. Appointments for miss exams must be made with the instructor within one week following administration of the scheduled exam. Consideration for make-up assignments will be given on the basis of documentation for an excused absence.

Excessive absences, tardiness, or leaving early will adversely affect the student's grade. *Tardiness will be documented as an absence; a student may request exception to this at the end of the class period for which he or she was tardy. Exception will be at the professor's discretion. Students will be allowed 1 class absence without penalty. Song Book & Song Check Guidelines:

Song Book: Part of the course is to learn to play the guitar and to begin to develop a repertoire of guitar music that you are able to play. It is expected that you maintain your collection of repertoire throughout this course. It is required that you use dividers to organize your collection. Keep an ongoing list of songs that are in your songbook. In your Final Performance, your instructor will randomly choose 2-3 songs from your songbook for you to sing and play. So be sure to complete your songbook before the Final Performance of the course.

Song Checks: Each Song Check day, you are required to bring you songbook. A song will be chosen from your ongoing list of songs for you to perform and teach for the class. On your assigned Song Check day, you will be responsible for making enough copies of the song for the entire class. Each Song Check day every student will collect the presented/performed songs and organize them into their songbook. As the semester continues, Song Check may involve playing more than one song. Music therapy students can expect to have your Song Check to include therapeutic objectives.

**As the semester progresses, it is expected that the difficulty of songs will increase. A songbook with 30 songs using only 2 chords is NOT acceptable. Likewise, a songbook with 30 songs in only one genre/category is NOT acceptable. Please consider this project as starting your collection of music for clients. It is required by the end of the semester to have a varied repertoire across multiple genres/populations.
