Course Description: This course is designed to be a broad survey of the field of psychology covering such topics as learning, perception, personality, development, psychopathology, etc. It covers both the theoretical basis and the empirical content of these areas.

Course Objectives:

By the end of the semester, the students will be able to do the following:

- 1. Describe both historical developments and current theoretical perspectives prominent in the field of psychology
- 2. Identify terminology unique to the study of psychology
- 3. Describe experimental methods used by psychologists in the study of behavior and mental processes
- 4. Demonstrate familiarity with the domains of theory and research in psychology to include: biopsychology, sensation and perception, learning, development, intelligence, memory, consciousness and psychological health and disorders.
- 5. Explain the process of how psychologists critically analyze data to protect against bias and to contribute to contemporary theory in an objective and parsimonious manner.

DR. CANTU'S COURSE POLICIES

Classroom Conduct, Participation, and Reading

We strive for interesting discussions online; however, students may not be disrespectful towards others. For example, derogatory comments based on race, ethnicity, class, gender, sexual orientation, or nationality will not be tolerated. Students are responsible for reading all chapters by the appropriate date. Class assignments are based on the student's independent reading of the chapters. Online participation in the form of submitting assignments, completing exams, and exchanging emails is required. Strong online participation will be helpful if you are a couple points shy of your desired final grade.

Missed Work

Students are responsible for completing assignments by due dates. Make-up work will not be given without a compelling reason (i.e., medical or family emergency) that can be documented (in writing). If you are permitted to make up work, it must be done during finals week. You can always complete work early, if you are planning on being out of town. Incomplete final grades are rarely given and will not be provided absent a very good excuse. Additionally, the university requires a written contract related to the work and the proposed completion timeline. If you cannot complete the course due to a family death, provide written documentation of the loss.

Internet Policy

Each semester I have students who report their assignments were interrupted due to internet problems. We can avoid many of these crises by reviewing some tips below. Please be aware I have the discretion to allow you to complete interrupted assignments. When there are internal glitches in Blackboard, I typically am aware of those and offer re-dos to those affected. If your problem is unique, I consider the circumstances. Here is a list of expectations I have of you:

First, it is your responsibility to conduct work in a place with dedicated access on either a desktop or laptop. Work completed on tablets and smart phones often result in service disruption, which kicks you out of the system. Please do not use a tablet or smart phone for assignments. Many assignments have a large time frame, so complete work when you know you have dedicated internet. Secondly, it is your responsibility to conduct work at a time when you are free from distractions (e.g., after work, after kids are asleep, when you are prepared to do well, etc.). Assessments have a time limit, and each exam or quiz will submit your attempt once the time limit expires. Next, you are also responsible for having the best browser (I recommend Firefox) and deleting cookies often. It may seem silly, but online learning platforms are sensitive to browser settings. Finally, keep in mind that when you report internet problems, I can review your online access in the class (e.g., when you logged in, how long you stayed on a page or assignment, whether you saved it, and your IP address). Please do not misrepresent the truth as there is an internet trail. I am much more apt to help you if you are forthcoming about difficulties managing responsibilities than I am if you report fraudulent work attempts.

If you have any difficulty "seeing" class modules (e.g., Exam 1 material), contact the Blackboard help team first. It is likely this is a problem with your account. If you fail to see an assignment (e.g., Chapter 1 Quiz) that should be there and you can see the rest of the page, send me an email as the link may be inactive. If you are trying to complete work after the due date, it will no longer be visible.

Grades will be posted on Blackboard as soon as they become available. FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Do I need to buy/read the book? Yes—you will not be able to earn an A-C without reading

When can I take the exam? Exams magically appear at 12:00 a.m. on Friday and close at 11:59 p.m. on Sunday. You can log in Friday-Sunday to take the exam, but once you log in, you have one hour to take exam.

What is the exam format? They consist of 50 multiple choice questions to be completed through the Blackboard online system. Each question is worth 2 points. The total exam is worth 100 points. You do not need to go to an exam center, or need a password. Exams cover information presented in the power point slides and in the book.

Can I make up MISSED work? Yes, however, you must make up work the last week of class. You can only make up 2 assignments—either 2 quizzes OR 1 exam & 1 quiz. Discussions cannot be made up as they are live conversations between peers. You must provide documentation to receive credit for missed work. Students who have emergencies and miss work must contact me ASAP via email. Students who have scheduling conflicts with an exam should arrange to take the exam prior to the exam date. You are not able to "re-do" items.

Is the final exam cumulative? No- It covers the final chapters in the book

What's up with the quizzes? The quizzes feature 5-10 questions. The quiz simply helps you stay on top of reading. Think of them as a multiple choice reading comprehension assessment.

Can I turn in study guides? No- They are non-graded study tools to help you master the concepts. Please complete them if you want to earn an A or B.
