COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Further development of financial accounting concepts, interpretation, and further study of management uses of accounting data. It includes a study of basic accounting concepts, interpretation of accounting reports, cost control and analysis, and methods of measuring performance.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

The objective of this course is to provide a strong foundation for future courses by:

- 1. Learning to apply course material (to improve thinking, problem solving, and decisions);
- 2. Gaining factual knowledge (terminology, classifications, methods, trends);
- 3. Learning fundamental principles, generalizations, or theories.

Upon completion of this course, students will have learned the:

- 1. The student will understand the terms and concepts used in managerial accounting.
- 2. The student will be able to solve problems involving topics covered in the course.
- 3. The student will be able to apply managerial terms, concepts, and procedures to managerial situations.

COURSE EVALUATION PROCESS:

Four unit exams will be given that are worth 100 points each. There will be no makeups on individual exams. If an exam is missed, the student will receive a grade of "0". There will be an optional comprehensive makeup exam at the end of the semester. This exam can replace the lowest of the first three exams. A second missed exam will result in a "0" that cannot be replaced. The fourth exam is the final exam that must be taken and cannot be dropped. In addition, there will be 6 quizzes worth 10 points each but the lowest quiz will be dropped for 50 possible points.

Letter grades will be assigned based on the percentage of points earned as follows: 90% = A, 80% = B, 70% = C, 60% = D, and less than 60% = F.
