COURSE DESCRIPTION

Prerequisite: FORS 3420 Human Osteology

This course introduces the methodologies and applications of forensic anthropology. It is designed to equip the student with knowledge and techniques of forensic anthropology with many hands-on exercises. In the first part of the course students will learn about the history and development of forensic anthropology, research methods and osteometry of the human skeleton.

The human skeleton will be reviewed, including the growth and development of the skeletal system.

Students will learn methods of analysis in building the biological profile. These methods of analysis include the determination of sex, age, race, and stature.

Students will be assigned a skeletal case and will utilize all methods of forensic anthropological analysis taught during the course.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

1. To gain knowledge of the forensic anthropology discipline.
2. To understand the theory, methodology, and research of forensic anthropology.
3. To introduce new forensic anthropology terminology and applications.
4. To integrate methodologies with practical applications.
5. To understand ethical responsibilities of the forensic anthropologist, how to write case reports and give courtroom testimony.
