Course Description:

MUSI 1223 expands the study of diatonic Western musical elements to include diatonic triads and diatonic seventh chords, non-chord tones, an introduction to studying musical form, and an introduction to two-part tonal counterpoint. Special emphasis is given to harmonic analysis and part writing.

Co-enrollment:

Students in MUSI 1223 must also be enrolled in MUSI 1225 (Musicianship II) to ensure maximum success in learning the fundamental concepts of Western music. Please notify your instructor immediately if you are not currently co-enrolled in MUSI 1225.

Class Participation:

When you come to class, be prepared to participate in discussions and other classroom activities. Bring your questions to class! Students who have not brought their materials, are sleeping in class, are not paying attention, or are disrupting the learning environment, may be asked to leave class and will be counted absent for that class period.

Theory Department Attendance and Tardy Policy:

Regular and punctual attendance is expected throughout the semester. University policy permits 3 classroom hours of unexcused absence without penalty per semester (T Th = 2 absences). For each additional unexcused absence, 3 points will be deducted from your final grade. Being late to class 3 times equals an unexcused absence.
