Course Description:

This is an introductory course on the role and function of the police in the criminal justice system and the broader society. Emphasis is placed on the development of policing and the roles of the police in contemporary America. Course content will emphasize issues and conflicts inherent in policing a democratic society. As a survey course, it examines the history of the police and the social values and value conflicts that underlay contemporary law enforcement. Moreover, the course includes an examination of important issues and topics. Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be familiar with both the practical and philosophical components of the American police force. Objectives:

Course Objective:

This course has three primary objectives:

- 1. Learn fundamental principles and theories of American police.
- 2. Gain the factual knowledge of the operations and practices of the police.
- 3. Know the impact of the importance of external environment on the police.

Course Requirements:

It is expected that students will read the assigned topic prior to class. Students should come to class prepared to discuss the scheduled topics and regularly participate in class.

Grading Policy:

The students understanding of police strategies will be evaluated through exams. The student can expect exams to consist of short answer, essay and multiple choice, and should come to class on exam days prepared with writing implements.

- 1. During the semester there will be four exams, each worth 100 points each. Expect these exams to be short answer, essay and multiple choice.
- 2. A quiz may be giving at any time, over the reading assignments.
