I. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course introduces the scientific approach to understanding the social world, the relationship between theory and research, research design, and data collection. This course is designed to help students gain an understanding of the research process with direct application to criminal justice research with a focus on various aspects of the research process including quantitative and qualitative methods.

II. COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Improve the basic understanding of key concepts and terminology in research methods
- 2. Demonstrate an overview of the fundamentals in research methods
- 3. Expand interest and ability to comprehend scholarly journal articles in the field and determine the quality of the articles based on their methodology
- 4. Identify academic resource to develop your own research question and research proposal
- 5. Improve your academic writing ability.

IV. COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

Students are expected to read the required reading, ask questions, participate in class discussions, and submit writing assignments. Keep in mind that this course is writing enhanced, which means that at least 50 percent of your course grade will derive from writing activities. Your final grade will be based on three exams, five writing assignments, six quizzes, and six class activity participations.

ATTENDANCE:

It is expected that students attend all classes. At the start of each class session, an attendance sheet will be distributed, however, your attendance WILL NOT count toward your final grade.

COURSE READINGS:

You will not be successful in this course without reading all assigned material. While I will lecture on course readings, my lectures alone will not substitute for completing your reading (all reading should be completed prior to the class period in which it is listed on the syllabus). You can locate assigned journal articles BlackBoard. Please keep in mind that class lectures will supplement readings and help you to synthesize what you have read. My PowerPoint slides will be made available to you through Blackboard after each class period to assist you in preparing for exams. If you miss class, you are responsible for obtaining any information/material that you may have missed. Do not ask for my notes from any class that you missed. I will not, under any circumstances, give out my lecture notes.

EXAM:

There will be three exams administered during this course. Exams will be worth 40 points each for a total of 120 points. Exams will be composed of a combination of multiple choice, true false, and fill in the blank questions. Questions will come from class discussion notes, homework assignments, and the required readings. Students are strongly encouraged to utilize the course resources to enhance their understanding of the materials, to prepare for exams, and successfully complete assignments. Students will have to use Respondus Lockdown Browser software and the webcams for all exams. A practice quiz is set up for students to use throughout the semester to test the respondus software prior to taking an exam. The exams will be available on Thursday 9:00 AM of the exam weeks and close at 11:59PM on the day that it is due (see schedule below). Basically, you will have two days to take the exam. Students are strongly encouraged to use Friday class hours to take the test. *There is a time limit for each exam*. The clock starts once you begin the test. The exams are set to force completion so if you log out or lose your Internet connection, the clock keeps ticking and will submit your test when the time is up. Make sure to have a dependable Internet connection when taking exams. *There will be NO make-up exams unless there is an extreme documented medical or personal emergency*. In the case of such an emergency, the instructor must be notified *prior to* the

absence. Early notification and/or proper documentation will not necessarily guarantee that a make-up exam will be granted. All make-up exams will be in the short-essay format. If the student misses the make-up exam, they will receive a zero for that exam without exception.

It is the student's responsibility to inform the instructor of his/her appointment including the date and time at the Testing Center **at least 3 business days prior to the scheduled exam day. Failure to do so will result in student taking the exam during scheduled exam time.**

QUIZZES:

Six quizzes are given during the semester to ensure student engagement and (i.e. students are keeping up with the required readings and actively participating in class discussions) and to help students prepare for the exams. Each quiz will be worth 5 points and you can earn up to 30 points (5 points*6 quizzes). Quizzes may be composed of true/false, multiple choice, fill-in-the blank questions, or a combination of each. Quizzes will be randomly administered throughout the semester. These quizzes are **NOT** eligible for make-up unless you have proper documentation to support the reason for your absence—this means that if you are not in class that day, you will receive zero for that quiz.

WRITING ASSIGNMENTS:

Five writing assignments are required in this course. The first writing assignment requires you to review and synthesize the assigned research article (Length 2 pages). The second writing assignment is simply the selection of a research topic and explaining why it is of interest. Additionally, you should be able to write one or two sentences of a research question that you would like your research proposal to answer (Length ½ to a full page). The third writing assignment requires you to find and review three articles relevant to your research topic (Length ½ page per each article). The fourth writing assignment is to develop the methodology of your proposed research (Length 3 pages). Developing upon the previous writing assignments, the fifth writing assignment requires you to develop a short research proposal. Your final writing assignment will include introduction, literature review, and method sections (Length 7-10 pages plus references and a title page).

Detailed instructions on how to complete all writing assignments will be discussed during the class and posted in Blackboard. Keep in mind that you will be graded on both content and formatting.

SUBMITTING WRITING ASSIGNMENTS:

There will be a submission link for every assignment in Blackboard. All assignments must be submitted in Word. Other formats will not be accepted. Your assignments **MUST** be submitted through the designated Blackboard links by the due date. <u>DO NOT</u> submit a paper copy in class or email me your papers.

Writing assignments submitted early will not be graded early. I strongly encourage you to not wait until the last minute to work on your writing assignments and be sure to plan accordingly with respect to deadlines. *Late writing assignment WILL NOT be accepted.*

Please note: Anti-plagiarism software will be used to check all assignments for originality. Plagiarism is a form of cheating, and will not be tolerated without an exception. If I find out that any student's assignment was plagiarized, then that student will receive a 0 on the assignment and will have to schedule a meeting with me to discuss the infraction. I reserve the right to impose more serious sanctions if the infraction is egregious. When in doubt, cite the source of the information and use direct quotes.

CLASS ACTIVITIES:

There will be six in-class activities required this semester (5 points each). The date of each required activity is listed in the course schedule of the syllabus. Class activities will consist of working in small groups (i.e. responding to written questions on course-related topics) followed up by broader classroom discussions. You will earn points through your participation in the class exercises, captured by the submission and discussion of your group's written responses at the end of the class period. Each group will include two to four students and group members will change over the course of the semester. The purpose of these activities is to get you to apply what you have learned in practical ways, encourage interaction with peers, and improve critical thinking skills.

These assignments are **NOT** eligible for make-up unless you have proper documentation to support the reason for your absence —this means that if you are not in class that day, you will receive zero for that assignment.

EXTRA CREDIT:

You may earn extra credit by attending writing sessions through the Academic Success Center (ASC) or through the Mentoring Office. Sessions are available online and in person. You can earn 5 points per session for a maximum of 3 sessions (15 points total extra credit points available in this course). I must receive proof that you obtained writing assistance from ASC or the Mentoring Office in order for you to receive extra credit points. Contact information for these resources is listed at the end of this syllabus. Other extra credit opportunities may be made available throughout the course, at my discretion.

V. GRADING:

This is a "W" course which means that at least 50 percent of your course grade will derive from writing activities designed to help you master course objectives.

VI. IMPORTANT POLICY INFORMATION:

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

Attendance is critical to your performance in this class. Class attendance requirements will be followed in accordance with Academic Policy Statement 800401 (http://www.shsu.edu/dept/academic-affairs/aps/aps-students.html). If you cannot attend a class, please notify me in advance. Further, you are responsible for obtaining any information/material that you may have missed. Do not ask for my notes from any class that you missed. I will not, under any circumstances, give out my lecture notes.
