



Course Description:

This course introduces students a brief overview of the principles of the crime scene investigation and developments in crime scene techniques. Students will learn scene assessment, photography, crime scene preservation, evidence collection, processing of evidence, the roles and the responsibilities of the Criminalistics laboratories. Upon completion, students should be able to, explain, and demonstrate the techniques of the investigative process, report preparation, basic knowledge of various



types of physical evidence, such as fingerprint, impression, hair, fiber, trace, firearms, tool marks, bloodstain patterns, and courtroom testimony. Credits: 3.

Course Objectives:

- Recognition of items of evidentiary value at the crime scene
- Understanding the proper procedures for processing indoor and outdoor crime scenes through the development of criteria and evaluation skills.
- Understanding the proper techniques for collection and preservation of physical evidence at the crime scene.
- Understanding of the value and the limitations of evidence, such as body fluids, firearms, impressions, glass, and trace materials discovered at the crime scene.
- Demonstrate the proper techniques for diagramming and photographing a crime scene.
- Understand how to hypothesize the sequence of events at a crime scene based upon interpretation of physical evidence.
- Demonstrate the appropriate safety techniques that are used in the collection of potentially bio-hazardous evidence.
- To aid the student in his/her academic and career interests relative to the crime scene investigation.

Course Requirements:

There is one required textbook for this online course: Practical Crime Scene Processing and Investigation by Ross M. Gardner. This class will be conducted through SHSU online blackboard. The lectures will be posted online within each unit along with chapter topics, learning objectives, question/answer segment, and other learning resources. It is a self-paced online course. Course materials will be released in unit blocks. These will be accessible the night before the start of a new unit. Students are responsible for accessing course documents, and taking quizzes and exams in the Blackboard system. Attendance Policy:
