Course Description:

This course is an analysis of police policies with particular attention to the current major problem areas from the point of view of both the administrator and the line officer. Established scientific knowledge is integrated with practical police experience in a various areas of police functioning.

Course Objective:

This course has three primary objectives:

1. Learn fundamental principles and theories of American police.

2. Gain the factual knowledge of the operations and practices of the police.

3. Know the impact of the importance of external environment on the police.

Course Requirements:

Online course requires a special personal discipline to keep up with the work load and make the whole program an enjoyable and enlightening experience. You will not achieve this experience if the requisite reading is not undertaken. Additionally, articles will be posted on the web which you will want to read. These results go towards your student demonstration of participation. This does not mean that you should read only the required texts and posted articles. During the course, you may be asked to find and post additional web article(s) that, for example, either support or reject a particular theory. Students are expected to have read the assigned readings prior to each online class module session.

Grading:

Exams – There will be 4 tests worth 100 points each (400 total) (50 questions multiple choice –source of questions - chapter reading)

Assignments and course requirements:

Chapter Reviews – Students will be required to access the 15 chapter reviews online and complete them by the indicated dates for each of the chapters. Each chapter review is worth 20 points (300 total).

Total points available 700.

Policy regarding final grades:

Grades will only be rounded to the next grade level if your final percentage grade is at or above 0.5. For example, grades of 79.5, 69.5 would be rounded up to 80 and 70 respectively.

I do not deviate from this policy and will not change grades arbitrarily.
