COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Victimology is the study of victims. Within this course, you will learn about the development of victimology as a subfield of criminology, victimization trends, and the relationship between victims, offenders, and society by using crime specific categories. This course will cover theory, research, and policy implications related to the experience of victimization.

Many of the topics we will cover are sensitive, controversial, and emotional. During class or while reading assignments, you may find some of the material uncomfortable or unsettling. Moreover, students may find topics uncomfortable because of past experiences or the experience of loved ones. Given millions of people worldwide have been victimized, it is highly likely someone in our class has experienced some type of victimization. Please show respect for your classmates. You will never be forced to participate or watch videos that make you

uncomfortable. If at any point you feel uncomfortable, please excuse yourself from class for a few moments.

If the material brings up these feelings, or you are in a relationship you think is abusive, I urge you to:

- Talk to a trusted family member, friend, or mentor
- Seek help and support from: SHSU Counseling Center, National Domestic Violence Hotline, or the 24-hour national suicide hotline.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- 1. To garner an understanding of the **factual knowledge** of victimology, relating to knowing key terms, classifications/typologies, and research methods
- 2. To understand the **fundamental principles and theories** of victimology
- 3. To **apply course material** to the experience of crime victims across different crime types
- 4. To **critically evaluate** other ideas, points of view, and arguments as they relate to the study of victimology

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

Weekly modules, exams, and reflection papers

GRADING:

Grades will be based on exams and online discussions. There will be four standard exams, each worth 100 points. Exams will be multiple choice and true/false and will each be worth 20% of your grade. There will be time limits placed on the exams (1 hour and 20 minutes) and backtracking will not be permitted. Exams will be due by 11:59 pm on Friday. Please plan accordingly.

Throughout the semester, 4 reflection papers will be assigned. These papers are meant to connect readings to the material from your textbook and the lectures. These papers should include your name and be 2 pages long (i.e. they must extend onto the second page). Do NOT include the date, class, semester, etc. Unless there is medical documentation, papers will **not** be accepted after their due date.
