### **Course Description:**

Victimology is the scientific study of crime victims and focuses on the physical, emotional, and financial harm victims suffer due to crime. The purpose of this course is to examine victim-offender relationships, the interactions between victims and the criminal justice system, and the connections between victims and other institutions (such as the media, advocacy groups, and government). In exploring these connections, we will address the theory, research, legislation, and policy implications related to victimization. Students are expected to read assignments, use critical thinking skills, and analyze and evaluate victimization issues. At times, the issues raised in this course may be controversial and/or highly emotionally charged for some students. I ask and expect that every member of this class respect each person's position, regardless of your agreement or disagreement with a particular view. ### **Course Objectives**

- (1) To gain *factual knowledge* about the study of crime victimization
- (2) To learn to *analyze and critically evaluate* ideas, arguments, and points of view

### **Course Requirements:**

**Discussions.** (52%) Students will discuss points of interest from the course material each week. In an effort to facilitate meaningful discussions, students will be required to submit (1) "original posts" and (2) "replies" to other students' original posts. Students can earn a total of 12 points each week for their original posts and replies for a maximum semester total of 156 points (13 weeks x 12 points).

- (1) Original Posts: Students will respond to 13 weekly discussions. These are designed to promote critical thinking about a number of controversial victimization issues. Discussions will be based on lecture/text material, and must also incorporate supplemental material (such as related news articles, video clips). Each posting must be a meaningful contribution to the discussion (see instructions in the course). Original posts must be submitted before each Wednesday at 11:59pm during the weeks that posts are due (see course calendar for details). Late original posts will be eligible for half credit and will only be accepted until the close of the session (11:59pm, Sundays).
- (2) Replies: Given that discussions work best when students contribute to other posts, students are also required to respond to **one** other student's original post for each of the 13 weekly discussions. Replies must be meaningful (see instructions in the course). Replies must be submitted before each Sunday at 11:59pm. Late replies will not be accepted.

It is very important to read all original posts and replies before posting so you do not repeat content. Do not attempt to stop a discussion, but rather move it forward. Be respectful of others who disagree with you. Additional instructions about original and reply discussion posts are available on the course website.

**Exams.** (48%) Two (2) exams will be based on the course material. Each exam will consist of multiple choice and true/false questions. The exams are non-cumulative and will cover assigned readings, videos, assignments, and lecture material. Exams are designed to assess knowledge, comprehension, and critical thinking skills. Exams must be completed and submitted by the due dates featured on the course calendar, although early submissions are encouraged. While the exams are "open book" and students are permitted to use notes and the textbook, the exams are timed and it will be impossible to locate the answers without having read the material in advance. To do well on exams, students should view lectures and complete assigned reading before beginning each exam.

#### Extra Credit

There will be two extra-credit assignments this semester. During Session 6, you may write an essay related to a series of videos about "Olga," an abuse survivor. More details are provided in Session 6. During Session 15 you may present an essay related the media and victimization. Each is worth up to 2 points to be applied to the final grade.
