## Syllabus for Business Finance (FINC 3320) – Section 8 Spring 2018

Course Description: This 3-credit course covers the study of financial principles, including capital

budgeting, the management and sources of funds, techniques of financial analysis, cost of capital, financial leverage, capital structure, forecasting financial needs, working capital management, financial policies, and the analysis and regulation of security

issues.

Course Objectives: The objective of this course is for you to (1) gain factual knowledge (terminology,

methods, fundamental principles, and theories), (2) learn to apply course material (to improve critical thinking and problem solving ability), and (3) acquire skills in working

with others as a member of a team.

Upon completion of this course, you should have developed specific skills and

competencies related to the field of finance, including:

1. The role of the financial manager

- 2. Financial markets and institutions
- 3. Financial statements and their analysis
- 4. The principles of time value of money (Financial Math)
- 5. Corporate financing, specifically bond and stock valuation
- 6. The risk and return relationship
- 7. Cash flow estimation and capital budgeting techniques

Course Material: Required Material: Text - Fundamentals of Financial Management, concise eighth

edition, by Brigham and Houston – Cengage Learning (2015) ISBN 978-1-285-06514-4.

Students are <u>required</u> to bring a financial calculator to class- I suggest the Texas Instruments BAII Plus financial calculator (either student or professional version). You are welcome to use another type of financial calculator. However, I am familiar with the

BAII Plus and I will be using it to solve class example problems.

Prerequisites: Students will have earned a passing grade in ACC 2302 and Math 1324, and have

obtained junior standing

**Grading:** Your grade is awarded according to the standard 10-point scale. Your final grade is

<u>Assignments -</u> Assignments are completed through Blackboard, and/or through classroom assignments. There will be approximately 11 - 15 assignments, and each assignment is worth 5 - 15 points.

<u>Class Activities</u> – We may complete in-class activities. These activities may not be announced. Only those students in attendance at the class period a class activity is completed can earn points for these activities. Class activity points cannot be made up.

<u>Quizzes</u> – Four quizzes will be scheduled during the semester – one prior to each exam. Quizzes will normally be administered in class, but may be converted to an online activity if time constraints mandate. Each quiz is worth 10 points. In-class quizzes CANNOT be made up. They can only be rescheduled (in advance) to accommodate <u>official university absences</u>.

<u>Project</u> – This course is administered using a Project-Based Leaning (PBL) approach. Students will join a group, and each group will complete project activities, including in-class work and deliverables, that correspond to each section of course material. The final activity will include a group presentation during the final class session (Thursday, May 10<sup>th</sup> from noon to 1:50).

<u>Exams</u> - There will be four exams. All exams will be closed book/closed notes and will be in a multiple choice, completion, True/False, and/or problem solving format. Students are allowed to create a reference sheet for each exam (ONE side of an 8.5 x 11 sheet).

Anticipated exam coverage and approximate dates:

**Exam 1**: Chapters 1 - 4 (Thursday, February 15<sup>th</sup>) → An overview of financial management, financial markets and institutions, and financial statement and their analysis.

Exam 2: Chapters 5 & 7 (Thursday, March 8<sup>th</sup>) → Financial Math, and bond valuation/return

**Exam 3**: Chapters 8, 9 & 10 (Tuesday, April  $10^{th}$ )  $\rightarrow$  The risk return relationship, stock valuation/return, and the cost of capital

**Exam 4**: Chapters 11 & 12 (Tuesday, May 1<sup>st</sup>) → Capital budgeting techniques and cash flow estimation

I will calculate the test average (60% of course grade) using the highest three test scores (effectively allowing you to drop your lowest exam score.) There will be no makeup tests. There is no exception to this policy. However, I do reserve the right to offer an alternative test time to students who notify me of <u>valid conflicts</u> PRIOR to a scheduled test. Alternative test times must be scheduled and the makeup tests taken before exam grades are posted.

<u>Attendance</u> – Attendance is necessary and expected. Attendance is taken at all class sessions. Students are allowed four absences (excused or unexcused)- a student missing more than four class sessions will have their final course percentage dropped by two percentage points for each absence over the maximum of four. Attendance will be recorded from an attendance sheet passed each class day. It is the student's responsibility to sign the attendance sheet.
