### **Course Description and Objectives**

This course is a study of the theory, research, and practice of communicating within and across cultures. Research in intercultural communication will be studied with an emphasis on application to the student. Special emphasis will be given to exploring the Cajun culture of Southern Louisiana and its relationship to the Acadian culture of Northeast Canada.

#### **General Course Policies**

1. ATTENDANCE. Attendance is essential for class participation and is checked each class period. No distinction is made between excused and unexcused absences. Each class period is worth points toward the participation grade. As per university policy, each student may be absent three class hours without penalty. For every three hours of absences beyond the third hour absent, the course grade may be lowered by one letter grade.

If a student enters class after the instructor finishes taking roll, that student is considered absent. It is the tardy student's responsibility to notify the instructor of his/her attendance before leaving that class period; otherwise, the absence stands. Two tardies = one absence.

2. GRADING SCALE. All grading is done on a total points basis, with a total possible of 1000 points for the class. Final grades will be determined by total number of points earned, using the following 8% scale: A=920+; B=919-840; C=839-760; D=759-680.

3. PARTICIPATION. Twenty percent (20% or possible 200 points) of the final grade comes from class participationparticipation in class discussions, cultural paper presentations, *Catherine's Cadeau* chapter summaries, etc.

4. EXAMS. Four exams will be administered covering content from class lecture/discussion, and assigned readings. Each will be a 150-point exam. (Total: 60% of grade or 600 possible points)

5. CULTURAL ANALYSIS PAPER. Each student is required to write an 8 to 10 page paper discussing the 10 most important characteristics of a culture of their choice (and must be approved by the instructor). Any reputable sources are acceptable, either online or traditionally published. Sources MUST be cited in the paper. (Wikipedia is an example of an <u>unacceptable</u> source for this assignment.) More detail will be given in class. (Worth 200 points toward grade or 20% of final grade.)

6. LATE WORK. There are NO make-ups for scheduled presentations missed. Missing a scheduled presentation results in ZERO credit on that presentation. Credit for any late work is given at the discretion of the instructor. Any tests or assignments accepted late will incur a standard penalty of 10% per day late. The phone number or e-mail address listed above is to be used to explain extenuating circumstances for any missed or late work.

7. BLACKBOARD COURSE WEB PAGE Students are required to use the Blackboard (Bbd) course homepage for this class. Assignments, due dates, handout information, changes in class schedule, etc., will be posted there as needed. It is highly encouraged that you check the Course homepage regularly. This will save you time, work, and stress.

8. OPTIONAL FIELD TRIP. Students will be given the opportunity to take a supervised, but optional field trip to Lafayette, LA during the semester. First-hand experience of the Southwest Louisiana Creole and Cajun cultures is a highlight of this field trip. More detail will be given in class.
