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MCOM 3372 Single Camera and Non-linear Editing.

This course teaches pre-production, field production, and post-production techniques. Elements include field camera setup and operation, remote lighting, remote sound, and basic continuity editing with an emphasis on underlying principles of video technology. Students are expected to produce original content for broadcast on Cable Channel 7. Prerequisite: MCOM 1371, MCOM 2371. Credit 3.

Course description: This course is designed to study the repeated practice in camera operation, video production and editing process in post- production. This introduction to field video production course will emphasize film-shooting techniques in shot composition, editing, lighting, and sound.

Course Objectives: To be proficient in digital filmmaking on location, operate digital video cameras, lighting, sound, music, creative nonlinear editing skills, and visual story telling techniques.

Course Requirements

You are expected to read and perform all assigned materials.

You are required to participate in all class lectures and production activities.

You are required to partake actively with your group members at all times.

You are to submit all written assignments on due date and time.

All assignments such as loglines, and scripts must be typed.

All footage is to be shot using the Black Magic, Cannon Rebel t7i or Panasonic AG and edited using Adobe Premiere Pro.

Required Supplies

Headphones/Earbuds

USB Flash Drive 32GB or another external storage device

SDHC or SDXC Flash Memory Card 32GB or higher UHS-1 (Class 10)

No micro sd cards. Use of these cards in university equipment will result in the loss of equipment privileges.

YouTube Channel

You are expected to provide headphones, SDHC card, props, talents, storyboards, and set design for each of your production projects. This course combines lectures and productions to help students learn the technical elements involved in the process of field moviemaking as well as post-production.

ATTENDANCE

ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADING: Assignments must be handed in during class on a thumb drive or saved to the classes group folder located on the Mass Comm. server unless otherwise indicated by instructor. Late work is accepted with a 50% penalty. Video projects will be evaluated based on creativity and execution. Each project is designed to get the student accustomed to using video cameras along with Adobe Premiere video editing software. At no point should the student risk bodily harm to complete a project. No shooting video while driving a car, no jumping off a balcony, nothing dangerous.

ACADEMIC HONESTY: All students are expected to engage in all academic pursuits in a manner that is above reproach. Students are expected to maintain honesty and integrity in the academic experiences both in and out of the classroom. Any student found guilty of dishonesty in any phase of academic work will be subject to disciplinary action. ASSIGNMENTS

Project 1- Visual Story Telling 25 Points

Each student must shoot a short film with a minimum one minute run time.
No dialogue in film. Story must be told with visuals and sound/music only (No copyrighted music)
A storyboard should be submitted with at least 12 frames
Project should consist of at least 12 shots that demonstrate different film compositions and techniques
Final film edit should be submitted to instructor via YouTube or Vimeo link.
Finals will be shown in class with Q&A
Storyboards due by Monday January 29th
Everything must be submitted and ready for viewing by Monday, February 12

Project 2 – Documentary film 25 Points

Student groups will shoot a short documentary with a minimum 2 minute run time.
Students will be in groups of two
Subjects can be fiction or non-fiction
Film should feature one on-location interview
Questionnaire script should be submitted to instructor
Interview should appear professionally lit
Story should be heavily narrated by interviewee
B-roll segments or dramatizations should be used to support interview
Should have appropriate music bed
Editing should feature lower thirds, title frames, or photos.
Final film edit should be submitted to instructor via YouTube or Vimeo link.
Finals will be shown in class with Q&A
Scripts due by Monday Feb 26
Everything must be submitted and ready for viewing by Wednesday March 7

Project 3 – 5 Minute Film Fest 25 Points

Student groups will shoot a short film with a total run time of five minutes. Each student will be responsible for submitting edited 30 second trailers for the film they worked on.
Student will be in groups of 3-4
Script should be submitted to instructor
Story board should be submitted to instructor
Film should have at least 3 characters
Scenes should be professionally lit
Editing should feature music, opening titles, credits, color correction
Final film should be provided to instructor digitally in highest available quality for projection showing
Each student will need to submit a: 30 second trailer for the film they worked on via YouTube/Vimeo link to instructor
Scripts due by Wednesday March 28th
Everything must be submitted and ready for viewing by Monday, April 29th

Additional Points - Participation and attendance 25 Points

Students will be expected to come to class and produce work outside of class hours. Class is used to go over camera operation, lighting, recording audio, editing, and film techniques to enforce how students operate on their own productions throughout the semester. We will be reviewing all films in class to provide feedback to the filmmaker. Class may occasionally be held in the editing room 311 or in Studio B down stairs.

Extra Credit – Production Work 25 Points

Throughout the semester the opportunity to work on promotional shoots for the theatre department, working on The Underreported and the department's faculty film. Participation on these projects will count as extra credit.

Students will be responsible for scheduling shooting time around the availability of equipment check-out closet.

Note: Before you submit your projects for screening in class, please make sure of the following. The total running time. Audio levels are equalized, Audio volume **MUST NOT BE LESS THAN -60 and MORE THAN -06** on the audio meter (Adobe Premiere Pro) Cross fade all audio transitions. Video files are exported at H.264 1080 HD 29.97 fps
