STUDENT ABSENCES ON RELIGIOUS HOLY DAYS POLICY:

Section 51.911(b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose. Section 51.911 (a) (2) defines a religious holy day as: "a holy day observed by a religion whose places of worship are exempt from property taxation under Section 11.20...." A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence.

University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s). The instructor will complete a form notifying the student of a reasonable timeframe in which the missed assignments and/or examinations are to be completed. SPECIFIC COURSE SYLLABUS

DESCRIPTION OF COURSE

Continuation of SPAN 2311 with emphasis on pronunciation, vocabulary and basic language codes stressing an oral approach with special emphasis on conversation and oral skills. Prerequisite: Grade of C or better in SPAN 2311 or equivalent. By the end of this course you will have general knowledge of Spanish vocabulary and grammar, you will have acquired a better understanding of Spanish speaking cultures and you will be able to communicate effectively in general settings using Spanish.

STYLE

The course uses the on-line BLACKBOARD platform. Through Blackboard you will access McGraw-Hill Education Connect® to complete assignments that come with your textbook purchase. Since practice is what makes you able to learn a new language, McGraw-Hill Education Connect® is organized for you to study the materials first, then practice and assess what you have learned.

Two or three weeks before the end of the semester, the student will be asked to complete an official IDEA evaluation of the course and your instructor. The three essential and important objectives for this course are:

- Developing skill in expressing oneself orally or in writing (in the target language)
- Developing specific skills, competences, and points of view
- Gaining a broader understanding and appreciation of intellectual/cultural activity

COURSE OBJECTIVES (Optimal activities)

1. To **LISTEN** to and comprehend basic descriptions and narration of standard Spanish spoken at average native speed by concentrating on major words known (with the help of cognates) and by making educated guesses at the rest.
2. To **SPEAK** without notes (or read aloud) a more than survival percentage of standard Spanish with few enough pronunciation errors (speed secondary) to be comprehended by a native speaker.
3. To **READ** and comprehend survival percentage of standard Spanish by concentrating on major words known (with the help of cognates) and by making educated guesses at the rest. With the further help of a dictionary, to be able to comprehend a high percentage of standard Spanish.
4. To **WRITE** about basic topics at a survival level in standard Spanish with few enough grammar errors to be comprehended by a native speaker
5. To **DEVELOP AWARENESS AND APPRECIATION** of the target language and culture, to make connections and comparisons to the first language and culture.

GRADE/PRESENTATION:

- 1. Pronunciation/Fluency
- 2. Style of presentation
- 3. Vocabulary
- 4. Grammar accuracy

WRITING ASSIGNMENTS (10%):

To increase the correctness of your written expression in Spanish, and develop your listening and speaking skills through the peer-editing component, you will write 3 compositions. The composition has a first version (draft) and a final version, and it has to be completed in your blue book and Blackboard.

All writing is to be your own work. **The use of translation devices or services to complete a writing task is not allowed.** If the instructor, after comparing a student's composition with other written assignments, determines that the student copied or used an online translator to complete the composition, an automatic zero will be given.

The compositions has two parts: the first draft and the final version. Students will write the draft, review the instructor's feedback, make the corrections suggested by the instructor and submit final version. You must complete both the draft and the final version or you will receive a zero. No exceptions.

The final version of all compositions has to have a minimum of 250-300 words.

CULTURE ACTIVITIES (5% total)

Culture activities will be assigned in Connect with additional individual activities assigned on Blackboard.

GRAMMAR/VOCABULARY ACTIVITIES (20% total):

LearnSmart 4%

LearnSmart is an adaptive tutorial that you should work through at least once, though each module can be completed as many times as you like.

Connect 16%

Connect activities should be accessed through Blackboard in order to sync your progress and save the grades. You will receive the points earned on your BEST attempt (out of three possible attempts) for that activity. **IMPORTANT: NO LATE SUBMISSIONS WILL BE**

ACCEPTED.

Homework 10%: (Discussion board)

You will have to post a comment about different topics in the Discussion Board tab on Blackboard. You must post by Monday and respond to at least 2 classmates by Friday.

UNIT PROGRESS CHECKS (10%):

During each unit, you will complete a check on your progress in learning and using Spanish.

1. LISTENING COMPREHENSION (dictation, oral questions, oral passage, true/false, other)
2. VOCABULARY (fill in, definitions, identifications, other)
3. GRAMMAR (fill/in, translation, other)
4. READING COMPREHENSION (questions, true/false, other)
5. WRITING (essay, short answer, other)
6. CULTURE (true/false, multiple choice, other)

IMPORTANT: FINAL EXAM IS MANDATORY AND COMPREHENSIVE.

There is no make-up, late submission provision for any exam. With a *well-documented* and *well justified* reason, the student may request a make-up from Instructor *within 24 hours*.

Because successful language learning requires active and regular engagement, regular attendance is crucial to your success in the course. **After 3 unexcused absences, you will**

have 2-point reduction for each absence from final grade.

STUDY TIPS

GENERAL RULE OF THUMB: TRY TO INCORPORATE SPANISH INTO YOUR REGULAR, EVERYDAY LIFE AS MUCH AS POSSIBLE.

- Practice listening and speaking. Make a friend who speaks Spanish (either as a student or as a native), and attend cultural events. Watch television: news reports, listen to the radio, go to movies or rent videos in Spanish.

- Practice reading. Buy or borrow books or articles in Spanish: children's level, your particular interest: cookbooks, medical studies, etc. Subscribe to, buy or borrow a newspaper or magazine: AMERICAS, VANIDADES, BUEN HOGAR, COSMO.
- Practice writing. Find a pen pal, write and receive letters in Spanish, keep a journal/diary in Spanish, write your notes in Spanish, write creatively (stories) in Spanish, use computer programs in Spanish language (for example, set up your Social Media like Facebook or Twitter in Spanish)

SPECIFIC STUDY STRATEGIES

- Study with other students, get a tutor
- Buy or borrow a workbook or a text by another author: write out exercises
- Review your text: table of contents (write all you know and check), exercises (redo)
- Make note cards: use ink colors to indicate gender of nouns, etc. Make visualization/collage cards.
- Listen to your audio materials extra times or get others. Do exercises in accompanying workbooks.

USE YOUR RESOURCES

- **TUTORING.** Department of Foreign Languages free tutoring (see procedure and schedule posted). Our tutors are graduate students, most are native speakers who can help with specific areas, or to practice your oral skills. See posted schedule and contact information.
