COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Emphasis is placed on extemporaneous speaking and conversation. Reading materials from Spanish speaking countries will be included as a basis for conversation and composition. This course cannot be taken for credit by native Spanish speakers. Prerequisite: Grade of C or better in SPAN 3361 or consent of Chair. Credit 3.

GENERAL GOALS (Optimal results):

The course will achieve the goals by:

- (1) Using the target language, i.e., Spanish;
- (2) Exposing you to a variety of language structures, vocabulary, and cultural traditions; and
- (3) Promoting creative Spanish practice.

COURSE OBJECTIVES (Optimal activities):

- 1. Gaining factual knowledge.
- 2. Learning to apply course material.

This course has two delivery methods: (1) In-classroom instruction; and (2) Blackboard

GRADING COMPONENTS

Participation

To improve your understanding of the content in this class, it is important that you participate *actively* and *in Spanish*. For this reason, repeated disengagements from in-class assignments (e.g., spending time on an electronic device to check information unrelated to the assignment) will lower your participation grade *substantially*, as will repeated unexcused absences and tardiness. Two instances of **tardiness** count as one unexcused absence. Your first two (2) absences will not incur any penalty on your participation grade, regardless of whether you can document these absences.

Additionally, late work resulting from <u>un</u>excused absences will not be accepted for a grade. In the event of an excused absence, the assignment will be accepted for full credit, and will be due one class period after the student's return to class. Missed exams resulting from an excused absence must be taken one class period after the student's return (the student will take an alternate, but equivalent, version of the original exam.) Pre-existing travel plans are <u>not</u> a valid excuse for missing exams.

Homework

To reinforce the grammatical, lexical (vocabulary), and cultural information taught in this class, you will complete a set of activities. Although your instructor will give you ample time to complete these activities, you should not wait until last minute to begin working on them. Your instructor will provide more specific details about these activities during the semester.

Culture (in-class presentations)

You will give two 5-minute presentations on a topic related to Spanish/Latino culture. Be sure to obtain your instructor's approval before beginning to work on your presentation. Possible topics may include your favorite city (Madrid, Buenos Aires, etc.), your favorite painter (Picasso, Botero, etc.), or your experiences helping the local Spanish/Latino community (acting as a medical interpreter, teaching English as a foreign language, etc.). Before presenting your topics in class, be sure to upload your files to Blackboard by the deadlines specified on the weekly schedule below. Your uploads will help your instructor give you more detailed feedback on your effort.

Speaking Exams

To assess your ability to communicate orally in Spanish within the range of the grammar, vocabulary and cultural information covered in this course, your instructor will administer <u>five</u> (5) speaking exams. On the date of each oral exam, your instructor will pair you with another student randomly to role-play a situation. You will have about <u>four minutes</u> to perform the activity. Your instructor will provide more guidance during the semester.

(Written) Exams

There will be <u>five</u> written exams and a final exam. These exams will assess the breadth of your Spanish vocabulary and grammar, the level of your listening and reading skills in the language, and your knowledge of Spanish/Latino culture. The final exam will be comprehensive and cumulative. Only under the most exceptional circumstances will your instructor provide a make-up exam for the final. None of the exams will be curved. Study guides for each of these exams will help you in your preparation.

INCOMPLETES

Only under the most extreme and exceptional circumstances will the Department of World Languages and Cultures consider a petition for an Incomplete. You will need to present appropriate documentation for the circumstances that have impaired your performance during the period of classes. A low grade in the course does not constitute sufficient grounds for an Incomplete.

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY

All written work you turn in *must be your own*. NOT allowed: copying without acknowledging your sources; having another student, a tutor, or a friend proof and/or **correct** the work you are to turn in; and using electronic translation programs (e.g., Google Translate) to translate complete sentences and/or paragraphs. You may be asked to prove that something you have handed in is indeed your own work. Representing someone else's work as your own is an infraction of academic integrity and as such may result in serious academic sanctions.
