Course Description:

- This course is designed to develop students' use of improvisations, games, and ritual to enhance creative thinking, problem solving skills, characterization, and trust within the rehearsal process.
- Much of your grade will be based on work in class with a partner or partners.
- Some of your grade will be based on work that is rehearsed outside of class (classic scene and contemporary scene), performed in class and then reworked during class time. You must be available to work with a partner in the rehearsal process. If you are unavailable to work with your partner, your grade will be lowered. If you do not show up on the day when your scene is due to go up, you will be given an automatic ZERO for your scene. Your partner will not be penalized.
- You will be required to perform one classic and one contemporary scene and rework it in class.
 All students are required to see all four Department of Theatre and Musical Theatre Spring 2018 productions, which are <u>Lady Windermere's Fan</u>, <u>Clybourne Park</u>, <u>Speech and Debate</u>, <u>The Shape of Things</u>, and <u>Pippin</u>. Each production will be discussed in class.
- All students are required to keep a dream journal in order to create the dream scenes. This journal needs
 to be turned in at the time specified in the course outline. Failure to turn it in will result in a grade of zero
 for the dream journal.
- Research is also required for both the Classic scene and the Contemporary scene. The research must be
 turned in on the first day that scenes are performed. If the research is not turned in the student will
 receive a zero for the research for the scene. Research is comprised of character journals (at least six
 entries) and copies of any type of research used while creating the character you are playing in the scene.
- This is a very physical class so please wear clothing that is comfortable and loose fitting.
- Prerequisite: THR 1364. Credit 3.
