### Course Description

Introduction to the human disease, both communicable and non-communicable, via a basic survey of the etiology, signs and symptoms, diagnosis, and prevention of disease combined with scientific basis and various historical elements.

RATIONALE: Expose the pre-professional student to an engaging exploration of human disease in contrast to a normal healthy body. Content material is to be delivered in a fundamental approach to human diseases based on organ systems. Basic concepts of anatomy and physiology are reviewed for each system. Mechanisms and causes of disease are considered. Disease prevention is discussed. Context will allude to some treatments, but the class is not designed to fully consider treatment of disease. The student is expected to have a basic core knowledge of Anatomy and Physiology.

## Course Evaluation:

## Pertinent Sam Houston State University Policies

### Attendance and Make-up Policies

### STUDENT ABSENCES ON RELIGIOUS HOLY DAYS POLICY

Section 51.911(b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose. A student whose absence is excused under this

subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence.

University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s). This request must be made in the first fifteen days of the semester or the first seven days of a summer session in which the absence(s) will occur. The instructor will complete a form notifying the student of a reasonable timeframe in which the missed assignments and/or examinations are to be completed.

#### CLASSROOM RULES OF CONDUCT

Students will refrain from behavior in the classroom that intentionally or unintentionally disrupts the learning process, and, thus, impedes the mission of the university. Cellular telephones, iPods, and pagers must be turned off before class begins. Students who use their cell phone during class for ANY reason will be asked to leave that class and will receive an absence for that day. Students are prohibited from eating in class, using tobacco products, making offensive remarks, reading newspapers, sleeping, talking at inappropriate times, wearing inappropriate clothing or engaging in any other form of distraction. Inappropriate behavior in the classroom shall result in a directive to leave class. Students who are especially disruptive also may be reported to the Dean of Students for disciplinary action in accordance with university policy. Baseball caps/hoodies and sunglasses are not to be worn during class. The only exception is for religious beliefs, and you must get approval. Only registered students may attend class. Exceptions can be made on a case-by-case basis by the professor. In all cases, visitors must not present a disruption to the class by their attendance. Students wishing to audit a class must apply to do so through the Registrar's Office.
