COURSE DESCRIPTION

HLTH 4365 Health Care Policy.

This course prepares students in the essential health policy and law, and the policies and legal issues impacting health care and public health systems. Also included are the methods used to formulate health policies and laws. What is "population health" and why does it matter? How does the U.S health care system compare to health systems in other countries? Why are U.S. health care costs so high? How is the U.S. health system financed? What are the basic principles of health insurance? Who are the uninsured? What is the state of U.S. health care reform? It is critical that public health professionals be able to answer these questions and understand the components of the U.S. health care system. This course will answer these questions through an introduction to the delivery, quality and costs of health care for individuals and populations in the U.S. Introduction to Health Management and Policy will prepare you for future study and work in the public health field and provide foundational knowledge of the structure, processes and outcomes related to U.S. health services.

COURSE OVERVIEW

This class will explore the fundamentals of health policy and the U.S. health-care system. Health care is a complex interaction of health services, distinctive economic forces and sophisticated technology. It is subject to a high degree of government regulation, which is reflected in this course.

Health policy is also controversial, with few clear-cut answers. Politicians find health care lends itself to demagoguery because it is so personal to constituents' lives. The course will reflect that as well. Weekly course materials and activities include:

Focus on patient treatment, IRB regulations, and system communication. This assignment may be completed as a short paper. It should be two to three pages, Times New Roman 12pt font. Completion of this assignment with less than 3 grammatical, spelling or punctuation errors and the inclusion of evidence that you have in fact read/listened to the book will result in the addition of ten points to your lowest assignment grade. The ten points will be added after the grading of your last assignment. The extra credit needs to be submitted before 04/16/18. –I will add the points in the place most advantageous to your overall grade.

Each week you will be responsible for class attendance, participation, and completing the assigned readings as well as assignments.

BOOK CLUB PAPER

This paper will be a group submission, but you will each receive an individual grade. The paper should total roughly 1-2 double spaced page per group member. Please do not reiterate the book. I have read them all multiple times. Please do not reiterate one another's content. The purpose of this paper is to apply health policy analysis to your book in a unique and exciting way. While this paper may be relatively short, considerable analysis and consideration needs to be evident in the content. Please include at least 2 scientific journal references. Please include an APA reference list and APA styled intext citations. https://owl.english.purdue.edu/owl/resource/560/01/ Every student that downloads saves and then uploads the purdue owl citation guidelines to blackboard will receive 1 extra bonus point added to their paper grade. While referencing Jacob's book and course lectures is encouraged, please do not merely reiterate the materials. Please upload your paper through turn it in on Blackboard.

BOOK CLUB PRESENTATION

This assignment accounts for twenty percent of your final grade. Ten percent of that will be a true group grade. This is to prevent one section of the assignment from being great while the rest is terrible. However, ten percent of your grade will be derived from what your peers share in their peer review & what I view in your presentation. If I ask you a basic question from the book & you can't answer it, do not expect a good grade. Please be creative in how you present the book to the class and in how you relate it to the course material. I encourage you to use interactive materials such as socrative or kahoot. Don't expect a good grade just because you use an app. It needs to be relevant and fun to garner points. Even though you are teaching the class during this time, classroom rules still apply. Please be courteous to your classmates. Do not shame or belittle your peers!!

BOOK CLUB PEER REVIEW

Each person must submit an individual document to me within 24 hours of your presentation. Each person will submit a peer review report reporting on all group members including yourself. You must list one way each member could have improved and at least one thing they each did right. Please include yourself. Bobby Bearkat –She could have improved by showing up to every meeting. –She provided great visuals for our Prezi and bought props for our presentation.

EXAMINATIONS

The exam will be cumulative including 50 multiple choice ?s & 2 essays. It will be based primarily on the class lectures [aka, you need to take notes *or at least listen* when I talk], presentations and questions from the readings. The main objective will be to ensure you can demonstrate an

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understanding of the major theories and concepts associated with health policy and administration. The comprehensive exam will be open book and note, but it will be timed; so relying on these items is discouraged. The professor must be notified as soon as possible of any conflicts with the presentation or final exam dates. Exam make-ups will be scheduled in advance of the exam date, in the event of a conflict.
