## **Course Description:**

This course examines the scientific study of the psychological forces that make people unique – their personalities. A study is made of the major theories of personality; the biological and social factors in the development and functioning of personality are considered, their personalities.

<u>Prerequisite</u>: Six semester hours of course work in psychology.

## **Course Objectives:**

Students will broaden their knowledge and understanding of personality psychology through the importance of the unconscious, the role of the self, gender differences, the power of the situation, cultural influences, and other theoretical aspects of personality. Students will learn about the research methods and measurement tools used to evaluate personality, and become comfortable enough with these theories and tools to understand applications. By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Demonstrate knowledge of theories, theorists, research studies, concepts, and themes in personality psychology.
- Evaluate scientific research methods such as descriptive and experimental research and quantitative analysis.
- Apply major theoretical approaches to aspects of everyday life, such as biology, social factors, gender, culture, relationships and coping styles.
- Compare and contrast selected personality measures and assessments.

# **Missed Assignments & Assessments:**

Due dates for assignments and exams are fixed; late responses are not accepted.

### **Assignments and Exams:**

Graded activities in this course will include chapter-based discussion posts, reviews, and quizzes, a group writing project, and two exams. Chapter quizzes and discussion postings are due the Sunday night before the next chapter begins (assignments must be completed before 11:59 pm). Chapter reviews must also be completed and uploaded to blackboard the Sunday night before the chapter begins. This course will also include an intensive group writing assignment. Additional details regarding the group writing project and chapter reviews will be provided in a separate document.

## **Evaluation:**

The course grade will be based on weighted averages of the assignments and exams discussed above. In the final grade, quizzes will consist of 25%, exams 30%, discussion posts 5%, chapter reviews 5%, and the group project 35%.

#### STUDENT ABSENCES ON RELIGIOUS HOLY DAYS POLICY
