Course Description:

This Capstone course will provide graduate students with an opportunity to demonstrate in writing the mastery of safety and security issues, challenges, models, concepts, theories, trends acquired during the graduate journey. The demonstration will consist of linking content knowledge and contextualizing it through synthesis, integration, research, and critical inquiry into a written product created purposefully, with relevance, and with social, organizational, political, or cultural resonance.

Course Objectives:

In this course, our focus will be on these major objectives (as assessed by the IDEA course evaluation

system):

Essential:

- 1. Gain factual knowledge (terminology, classifications, methods, trends).
- 2. Develop skills in expressing oneself in writing through the composition of the final Capstone Research Project (CRP).
- **3.** Acquire interest in learning more about the focal safety and security topic under inquiry.

Important:

4. Develop skills relevant to practitioners in the field of Homeland Security Studies through collaboration and communication with professionals.

Course Requirements:

- 1. Students are expected to integrate expert knowledge available on the topic into the CRP.
- All written assignments are to be completed on time. Assignments submitted late will not be
 accepted. Job challenges are not considered reasons for not completing assignments. No
 incompletes will be given for this course without prior approval from the instructor and based
 on EXTREME unforeseen circumstances.
- 3. All written products should reflect graduate level quality scholarship and composition skills and follow APA, 6th edition.
- 4. Students are expected to spend the time necessary to keep up with the readings and the written assignments.
- 5. At all times the student is expected to maintain a professional presence in face-to-face or in electronic communications. Another part of professional behavior is meeting the requirements/deadlines for the assigned written products.

Course Grading:

The grade in this course will be based on the segments and drafts of the CRP and will be accrued incrementally through scaffolding of the CRP; integration of feedback from previous drafts into the final CRP will be paramount:

Student Absences on Religious Holy Days Policy:

Section 51.911(b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose. Section 51.911 (a) (2) defines a religious holy day as: "a holy day observed by a religion whose places of worship are exempt from property taxation under Section 11.20...." A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an

assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence. University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s). The instructor will complete a form notifying the student of a reasonable timeframe in which the missed assignments and/or examinations are to be completed. Cellular phones, pagers, laptops, and other electronic devices:

Only with a formal request from the Counseling Center will a student be allowed to use ANY electronic device during class to aid in the learning process.

As members of the classroom community, all students have a responsibility to others who are a part of that community. The goal is to produce an environment that is conducive to learning. Students are to treat faculty and other students with respect. Cell phones, laptop computers, pagers, and similar devices have become increasingly a part of everyday life in our society; however, when used in the classroom environment they can become disruptive. Students are to turn off all cell phones and other electronic equipment while in the classroom. When cell phones or pagers ring and students respond in class or leave class to respond, it disrupts the class. *Therefore, the use by students of cell phones, pagers, or similar communication devices during scheduled class-time is prohibited.* All such devices should be turned off or put in a silent (vibrate) mode and ordinarily should not be taken out

during class. If there is an emergency situation for a student, that student should inform the instructor and place himself/herself in a seat near the door where an exit for a phone call would be only minimally disruptive. With instructor approval, students may record lectures, take notes via laptop computer, etc., provided that they do not disturb other students in the process. Other exceptions to this policy may be granted at the discretion of the instructor. Any use of cell phones or other electronic devices during a test period is prohibited. Even the visible presence of a cell phone or other device during the test period may result in a zero for that test. Use of a cell phone during a test could result in a charge of academic dishonesty.
