Attendance Policy

Attendance at all classes, lab and PT sessions is mandatory. Excused absences are those coordinated in advance, with the exception of emergencies preventing prior communication.

Uniform

Uniform for lab will be ACUs/OCPs. If you do not have ACUs/OCPs, you can wear clothes in which you expect to get dirty. Example – loose jeans and a T-shirt. Uniform for class will be respectable attire. Furthermore, appropriate clothing of a moderate nature is proper for this class. NO HATS, Skullcaps, Doo-Rags, Handkerchiefs or similar headgear will be worn inside of classrooms. Pants/shorts will be worn to the base of the back so as to hide undergarments. No slacking or wear of trousers with underwear showing will be allowed. No clothing meant as undergarments worn as outer garments or sleepwear (slippers

included) allowed. No ratty torn clothes with offensive writing or suggestive phrases. Business casual is perfectly acceptable.

As a note, the use of laptops and tablets is allowed for class-related material only (e.g., taking notes, looking up content on the Internet). However, using electronics for personal or social purposes is not permitted and will result in a reduction of the class participation grade. Behaviors such as texting, engaging in social media, browsing the internet, and checking email is extremely distracting to other students as well as the instructor. If there is a need to use one's phone due to an emergency situation, please inform the instructor prior to class; in all other cases, phones should be on mute and stored away.

Course Description

The MSL I course produces a Cadet who accepts the Army as a values-based organization and embraces the scholar-athlete-warrior ethos; who is familiar with individual roles and responsibilities in support of team efforts and problem solving processes in military and non-military situations; who demonstrates oral and written communication skills, understands resilience, and demonstrates a commitment to learning. Live Honorably & Build Trust and Communicate and Interact Effectively. MSLC 1112 introduces college students to the personal challenges and competencies critical for effective leadership. Students learn to recognize and take responsibility for their own personal development through instruction in critical thinking, time management, goal setting, and communication. Students learn the basics of the communications process and the importance for leaders to develop the essential skills to effectively communicate in the Army. This course requires companion course MLSC 1101, Applied Leadership Lab 1, 1 hour.

As you become further acquainted with MSLC 1112, you will learn the structure of the ROTC Basic Course program consisting of MSLC 1101, 2201, 3301, 4303, Fall and Spring Leadership Labs, and Basic Camp.

The focus is on developing basic knowledge and comprehension of Army leadership dimensions, attributes and core leader competencies while gaining an understanding of the ROTC program, its purpose in the Army, and its advantages for the student.

Requirements

Army ROTC Writing Program (Lesson Assessments)

The Army ROTC Writing Program will provide you with writing opportunities to give you experience in the Army writing style. Army writing is easy to read and understand. It is clear and concise. Readers are able to understand the sender's message quickly and accurately.

The Army writing style is "writing you can understand in a single rapid

reading, and is generally free of errors in grammar, mechanics, and usage" and "is clear, concise, organized, and right to the point".

You will develop these skills through a series of assignments. You will be required to produce a brief analysis (min. 150 words) after each MSL100 class that is due at the next scheduled class. This should include what the lesson was about and how that lesson will help develop you as an Army Officer or in your future in general.

You will use these thoughts as a foundation for the final exam essay assignment. You will need to explain your thoughts and experiences in the class or classes aided in your development. Put this development in context with examples from your life up to now. The final exam essay will be between 3 to 5 pages in length.

Readings

Students are responsible for all assigned and/or optional reading assignments. Students are expected to spend adequate time reading and reflecting on all written materials **prior to class**.

Class participation (150pts)

You are expected to participate actively in learning through critical reflection, inquiry, dialogue, and group interactions. This includes participating in class discussion, sharing personal perspectives and experiences related to principles discussed in class or reading, working with fellow students to engage in class exercises, and leading lab exercises. <u>Failure to prepare and engage at an appropriate level will result in a grade reduction</u>.

Online SHARP Training (Mandatory Requirement)

This student assignment is conducted in two parts. Each part is only required to be successfully completed one time during BOLC A. more information to follow during semester.

Quizzes and Lesson Assessments (300pts)

<u>Quizzes</u> will be given throughout the semester to assess your progress in learning the principles and practices related to the course material.

<u>Lesson Assessments</u> are due at the beginning of each class day for the previously covered lesson. Each Lesson Assessment will be a one paragraph summary of the previous lesson and written in the Army writing style and APA standards.

Mid-Term Exam (200pts)

A mid-term exam will be given to assess your knowledge achieved during the first half of the semester.

Final Exam (300pts)

A cumulative final exam will be given to assess your knowledge achieved throughout the course of the semester.

APFT (120 pts)

As a future officer, you are expected to set the example for physical fitness according to Army regulations. Your goal should be to MAX all events on the APFT not just pass. You will never stop during an event on the APFT unless you are injured. You will be required to take a diagnostic APFT at the beginning of the fall semester and a Record APFT at the end of the semester.

The APFT lab grade points will be determined by the formula: (APFT Score-180=APFT lab grade points up to 120 max)

Inappropriate Relationships

Per Army Directive 2016-17 (Protecting Against Prohibited Relations During Recruiting and Entry-Level Training and IAW Department of Defense Instructions (DoDI) 1304.33 (Protecting Against Inappropriate Relations During Recruiting and Entry Level Training).

The Army and all Army personnel (including any Army military, civilian, or contractor personnel) will treat each prospect, applicant, recruit, and trainee with dignity and respect as they pursue their aspiration of serving in the military. Army policy prohibits inappropriate relations between recruiters and prospects, applicants, and/or recruits and between trainers providing entry-level training and trainees. At a minimum and as required, the prospect, applicant, recruit, trainee, recruiter, or trainer will complete

the following administrative actions. Commanders may add requirements to this list.

- (1) Trainers providing entry-level training will sign a DD Form 2982 that acknowledges their understanding of the prohibitions listed in paragraph 5d and their responsibilities regarding the policies to avoid the inappropriate behaviors and relations outlined in this directive. The DD Form 2982 will be recertified annually. The form will be locally filed and kept for 1 year after the trainer has left the unit.
- (2) At the onset of the first training session, trainers will brief trainees on the policies in this directive and provide information that trainees can use to contact someone in leadership if they wish to report any issue related to a trainer's inappropriate conduct.
- (3) Trainees will sign a DD Form 2983 to acknowledge their understanding and responsibilities as outlined in this directive no later than the first day of entry-level training. The DD Form 2983 will be locally filed and kept until 6 months after the trainee has left the unit.
