COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Border Security is a political hot button issue that impacts numerous homeland security themes including but not limited to: maritime security, the free flow of goods, services, and people in a market based society, immigration, the potential influx of terrorists, "border spillover" violence, drug trafficking organizations, foreign relations, human trafficking/smuggling, human rights, interagency coordination, economic development, etc.

This course will provide students with a historical and conceptual grounding in these issues through readings, lectures, guest lectures, tests, and in-class discussions. Typically the instructor will spend the first half of the class lecturing and lead discussion in the second half of the class. Students are encouraged to ask questions and participate in a manner that is respectful to the opinions of their colleagues.
