Course Description

The purpose of this course is to provide students with an introductory understanding of criminal courts in America. In doing so, the course will address three broad issues: 1) the purpose and organization of courts in modern American society, 2) the nature of the courtroom workgroup (primarily judges, prosecutors, and defense attorneys) and their decision making, and 3) the processes and procedures responsible for producing "justice." Addressing these three broad areas will allow students to get a sense of what the court system looks like in America, how the key players within the courts combine to produce important decisions (e.g., what charges to file, whether a plea bargain will be offered, what type of sentence is appropriate, etc.), and what the processes and procedures of justice look like. Students will acquire a thorough and comprehensive understanding of the criminal court system in the United States, and will be encouraged to share viewpoints, opinions, and ask questions when discussing topics on the class discussion board.

Course Objectives

The primary objectives of this course are to:

- 1. Introduce the students to the laws, procedures, and policies involved in processing an offender through the criminal court system.
- 2. Allow students to develop an understanding of roles and responsibilities of various officials involved in the court system processing offenders.
- 3. Examine the judicial system function, the courtroom actors and court process.
- 4. Familiarize the students with the types of law and the function of the court structure in addition to the theories of criminal court decision making.

Attendance Policy

Participation in online discussions is especially important in this course, and as a result, students will not only be given a score grading the quality of their discussions, but also an "attendance" score for meeting each of the discussion deadlines. In the end, the attendance points will be the "easiest" to earn, and are designed to provide extra motivation to participate in each of the discussions.

Course Requirements

All students are expected to read the required reading assignments and participate in the online discussions for each course session. Since a substantial portion of this course will entail online discussion, it is especially important that students pay close attention to the readings to promote insightful interactions within the discussion forums.

Exams - there will be three 3 exams.

There will be discussion questions in addition to attention to comments on other's comments. There will be opportunities for extra credit.

Discussion Ouestions

Discussions are a key component of the course. And this is where most of the "activity" will take place. Students are expected to participate in each of the discussions for the course sessions.

Students will be required to contribute their own original post to the discussion, and to respond to the posts of minimum two (2) other students. Participating in both of these functions is imperative to creating quality discussions. Additional details about the online discussions will be available on the course website.
