<u>Course Description:</u> This is a course designed to examine the nature, functions, limitations and objectives of law. Our focus will be to critically examine the law and to understand how the law impacts everyday lives. The course will examine but not be limited to such legal topics as civil law, civil courts, federal and state courts, criminal law and procedure, juvenile justice, gender and racial issues in the law, along with important issues as they relate to law such as abortion, the death penalty, and euthanasia.

Course Objectives:

The primary objectives of this course are to:

1. To understand the nature and function of law in our society today.

2. To critically think and formulate arguments, both written and oral (if a face to face class), about the complex relationship between law and society.

- 3. To be able to apply legal reasoning to difficult and novel topics.
- 4. To evaluate the way law has been utilized to provide social control and change.
- 5. To understand the influence of law over the course of human history.

Attendance Policy

Participation in online discussions is especially important in this course, and as a result, students will not only be given a score grading the quality of their discussions, but also an "attendance" score for meeting each of the discussion deadlines. In the end, the attendance points will be the "easiest" to earn, and are designed to provide extra motivation to participate in each of the discussions.

Course Requirements:

All students are expected to read the required reading assignments and participate in the online discussions for each course session. Since a substantial portion of this course will entail online discussion, it is especially important that students pay close attention to the readings to promote insightful interactions within the discussion forums. In addition, on each discussion question you are required to present your post to each question, you are required to comment on at least two (2) classmates' comments.

Exams - there will be three exams. (<u>Make sure you are at a reliable computer when you take</u> <u>your exams.</u>) You have to take the exams at one sitting, and <u>consider this notice</u> that you need to make sure you are at a reliable computer, in that you are allowed one attempt to take your exams.)

There will be Discussion Questions. <u>In addition</u> to commenting on each question, you are required to comment on at least two (2) classmates' comments.
