COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is designed to provide students with an understanding of how class, race, and gender interact with the dynamics of our Criminal Justice System. This class will provide information on both the historical perspective and current realities of the interplay between diversity and justice in America. Additionally, this course will discuss how race, class, gender, and crime are interrelated and how these four areas effect the social realities of today.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Upon completing this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Understand terminology related to Criminal Justice and Social Diversity (i.e. race, class, gender, and crime)
- 2. Understand theories explaining the interactions and treatment of minorities within the criminal justice system
- 3. Learn to think critically about social diversity and how diversity interplays with justice.
- 4. Be able to apply the material learned in this course to inform critical thinking, problem solving, and decision-making skills.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

All students are expected to complete the assigned readings prior to class as outlined in the schedule section of the syllabus. Your grade will be based on four exams, a group presentation, individual writing assignment, and your class participation/attendance points. These measures will be used to meet the course objectives.

Participation/Attendance Points: In addition to attendance considerations, your participation grade will be measured by your attentiveness in class, asking questions, class discussions, being engaged, and completing the assigned readings, etc. Each student will start the semester with 20 participation points. If a student is not actively participating in class, is consistently disruptive in class, or has exceeded two unexcused absences, deductions will be made. For each incidence there will be a 2-point deduction.

Exams: There will be four exams given during this course and they will be worth 75 points each. The exams will consist of a variety of multiple choice, true/false, matching, and short answer questions over the required readings and materials covered in class. These exams will not be cumulative and further information will be provided by the Professor closer to the exam dates.

Make-up Exams:

Only under extreme circumstances will I provide a make-up exam to a student who has an excused absence and has notified me *prior* to missing the exam. If you are unable to contact me prior to missing the exam, you must notify me in writing within 5 days of the absence. Verbal excuses will not be accepted

Group Presentation: Each student will be assigned to a group by the Professor and the group will be required to give an 8-10 minute class presentation, which is worth a total of 60 points. The presentation topics will be assigned by the instructor and the assignments are final. Presentation must be in a Powerpoint and further instruction will be given in class. The class presentations will be given during the last two days of class and finals day (May 2,4, 7, 2018).

Individual Writing Assignment: Each student will be required to submit a 3 – 5 page summation of what they have learned in the course and through the completion of their group project. The paper must be in APA format: double-spaced, times new roman 12-point font, 1-inch margins. An abstract is not required however, all sources must be properly cited both in-text and with a reference page. The paper will be submitted via turnitin in Blackboard and is due on April 30, 2017 before the beginning of class.

Extra Credit: There will be a total of 10 extra credit points that will be available during this course. The 10 points may be earned by writing a 2-3 page article review. More information will be given later in the semester.
