COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This is a hands-on course devoted to the art of editing. By the end of this semester you will have improved your editing techniques by cutting footage that presents you with a variety of challenges. You will have the option to use any professional editing software of your choice. We will not focus on software, but rather on how to create unique pieces through editing.

Lectures inspired by Karen Pearlman's excellent editing book "Cutting Rhythms: Intuitive Film Editing", hope to stimulate you to look at your editing more critically, artistically, and intuitively.

You will have limited time during classes to work on your pieces, therefore you are expected to edit on your own time to finish the assignments timely. It is imperative that you learn how to work with deadlines, as it will prepare you for the industry, therefore, late assignments will be considered for partial credit.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

By the end of the course, students will have:

- 1. Developed and expanded their hands-on experience in editing with a variety of challenging exercises.
- 2. Worked on their own personal films, focusing heavily on editing techniques.
- 3. Learned to look critically at their own work, as well as the work of their peers.

COURSE QUALIFICATIONS:

This is an advanced editing course; therefore, you are expected to know your way around professional editing software.

IDEA OBJECTIVES:

- Gaining factual knowledge (terminology, classifications, methods, trends)
- Developing specific skills, competencies, and points of view needed by professionals in the field most closely related to this course.
- Developing creative capacities (writing, inventing, designing, performing in art, music, drama, etc.).

REQUIRED MATERIAL:

You are required to have an **EXTERNAL HARD DRIVE** (formatted MAC OS Journaled or ExFat) with at least 1TB of memory and preferably with a USB 3.0 connection. Sharing hard drives or saving your assignments in the school computers or server is not allowed. It is highly recommended that you backup your project files on a separate flash drive after quitting each edit session to avoid the loss of your edited work in case your hard drive crashes. You are also required to have **HEADPHONES** or **EARBUDS**.

ATTENDANCE:

Your participation is important. You are allowed THREE unexcused absences. Every absence after that will cause you to lose 5 points of your Attendance grade.

ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADING:

Late assignments result in loss of points. If you have to miss a class when an assignment is due, have another student turn it in for you, or hand it in ahead of time. Please keep track of your own progress in the class. Keep all of your handed back assignments. Late assignments are docked one full letter grade per day. An "F" is equal to "0" points. The final film cannot be handed in late.

ACADEMIC HONESTY:

All students are expected to engage in all academic pursuits in a manner that is above reproach. Students are expected to maintain honesty and integrity in the academic experiences both in and out of the classroom. Any student found guilty of dishonesty in any phase of academic work will be subject to disciplinary action. This is a workshop environment, and all ideas, thoughts and critiques are welcomed. You are beginning, and a workshop environment will allow and encourage you to take risks, to try out new ideas.

Students will refrain from behavior in the classroom that disrupts the learning process and, thus, impedes the mission of the university. Personal Film Project: 300 points

Throughout the semester, each one of you will be working on your personal film projects. They can be anything you want: a short film, a TV pilot, a web series pilot, a short documentary, a music video, etc. Early in the semester you will write a proposal for this project to hand in. During the first half of the semester you will shoot your project, and during the second half you will edit your project. You are welcome to meet me during office hours to discuss the development of your project. The final film is due at the end of the semester.
