**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** This course teaches students the fundamentals of criminal investigation by examining the history of criminal investigations, the processes involved in identifying and arresting criminal suspects, identifying the types of crimes and offenses, and in preparing for court.

**COURSE OBJECTIVES:** Upon successfully completing this course, students will be able to:

- (1) Define terms related to criminal investigation
- (2) Outline the history of criminal investigation
- (3) Analyze the process of criminal investigation
- (4) Examine types of criminal offenses
- (5) Explain the relationship between criminal investigation and the courtroom process

### **COURSE REQUIREMENTS:**

You have elected to take an online course that will require you to dedicate enough time each week to cover the required material. You will have one lesson due by midnight every Saturday. Please manage your time wisely – if you get behind, you are effectively doomed  $\textcircled$ . Please heed this warning – MANAGE YOUR TIME! Don't get scared off – this is about the most straight-forward class you can take – you just have to stay on top of the material. It has been my experience that students who complete their work early score better on assignments than those who wait to the last minute; however, it is up to you to manage the lessons as you see fit.

The course consists of an orientation followed by 12 lessons. Each lesson has a checklist that gives you the reading assignment and the stated objectives for that assignment. You will also notice a section entitled "Captain's Corner". The Captain's Corner sections are basically my (and other officers') reflections on the material. I may try to add something that's not included elsewhere, clarify what may be confusing, and / or provide you with some "war stories" based upon my (and other officers') experiences. In some of these Captain's Corner sections I draw heavily from material produced by dear friends of mine, Chief Dave Barber (Ret.) and Chief Kevin Lunsford, who have both taught similar courses. Make sure you read the writings in the Captain's Corner – it will be tested material. Your assignments will generally consists of a short writing sample that may require some kind of Internet research to dig up pertinent information. Please don't use Wiki - it is not generally considered to be trusted source. You must cite your source - every time. Failure to cite is considered plagiarism and will not be tolerated. It can cost you points, failure, expulsion, and all sorts of bad things. Writing is expected to be of University level quality, including grammar, punctuation, spelling, etc. There will be PowerPoint presentations associated with each lesson. These are there to help you, but are not a substitute for reading the assigned material. All of this will be followed by a 10-question quiz that you will have 15 minutes to take. Be familiar with the material, as you will not have much time to browse through notes, books, etc. Read each question carefully and choose the most answer that best fits the question. Make sure you save and submit your answers at the end of the quiz. If you get kicked off the computer, you can get back in but your time keeps on running so don't mess around. In addition to the reading materials, assignments, and quizzes, there will be a final exam that will consist of 50 questions. The final will be comprehensive.

When you log into Blackboard you will see a list of Lessons (Lesson 1, Lesson 2, etc.) down the left side of the page under the Course Content section. Each lesson has a Due Date beside it. The lessons are due by 11:59 p.m. on that date - no exceptions. When you click on a particular lesson you will be taken to a page that is laid out something similar to the following:

### **EXTRA CREDIT**

Book review of *The Alienist* by Caleb Carr – Read *The Alienist* and prepare a written review (no more than 5 pages) of the book, comparing investigation techniques from then to now. This is a fictional story set in historically accurate NYC around the turn of the century (late 1800s - early 1900s). It involves a set of serial murders that occur and the investigation thereof. The murders are investigated by an Alienist, a reporter, and a couple of NYPD detectives. This all occurs during the time that new and unproven crime scene techniques are being postulated. The investigators try a number of techniques - some work, some do not.

Prepare a written review of the book, comparing investigative techniques from then to those of today that you've learned about in this course. This includes telling me what an Alienist is. The report should be at least 5 pages in length, excluding cover / citation pages (12 pt. font, double spaced). It must be of University level quality and will be graded accordingly. You can earn up to 40 points for the

assignment. This is generally enough to move you from one letter grade to the next if you do exceptional work.

It is an interesting book - I hope you enjoy it. You may email me the report in a standard Microsoft "Word" document upon completion.
