What the Sky Can't Hold – memoir

Set in Alaska the summer of 2001 and in New York City the following fall, this book takes readers into two distinct communities to look at ways people voluntarily drop out of society. It chronicles work in a wilderness lodge deep within Denali National Park, the oddities of ultra-secluded populations, and considers my own seclusion inside America's biggest city after 9/11.

The Greenest Grass – a novel

This story follows fifteen-year old Meg who wants to be a cowboy. Her family keeps her far from the dangers of their ranch. But danger is seductive. It lures Meg to run away to a rodeo, the first of many catastrophic attempts at finding her place in the Texas cattle business. By 30, the same pursuits lead her across the Atlantic to run an exhibit farm in the Loire Valley. Shortly before her grandfather dies, he disinherits her. Meg leaves France (and a French farmer) hoping to finally find a way into the ranching world that never wanted her. While she waits for multiple wills to be reconciled, she has to decide what she'll do if she's not the next proprietor of Meriland Cattle Company.
