TEACHING EXPERIENCE

Sam Houston State University, Huntsville, TX, 2017-Present

- **General Duties:** Responsible for developing syllabi, class content, writing assignments, class discussions, daily quizzes, grading, maintaining course content online via Blackboard, and office hours.
- ENGL 1302 (Composition II): This course promotes critical thinking and problem solving as students continue to develop their writing skills in English while they work toward more complex methods within the writing process. This course prepares students to write advanced essays and research papers, which reflect the conventions of academic writing and develop the skills needed to support arguments effectively through research and proper documentation.
- **ENGL 1301 (Composition I):** Students focus on writing academic texts and incorporating appropriate documentation through the basic study of English diction, sentence structure, and rhetoric with an emphasis on the development of a thesis or claim. During this course, students work toward building a solid academic framework as they develop their ideas through invention and learn to express them clearly and persuasively.

Fayetteville Technical Community College, Fayetteville, NC, 2015-2017

- **General Duties:** Responsible for developing syllabi, class content, writing assignments, critical reading instruction, class discussions, daily quizzes, exams, grading, maintaining course content online via Blackboard, holding office hours, volunteering at the writing center, High School Connections dual credit, and academic advising.
- ENG 231—American Literature I (Beginnings-1865): Students read, discuss, and reflect on selected works in American literature from its beginnings to 1865. By placing emphasis on historical backgrounds, cultural contexts, and literary analysis of selected prose, poetry, and drama, students learn to analyze and interpret literary works in the appropriate historical and cultural contexts.
- **ENG 126—Creative Writing II:** As the follow up to ENG 125, students continue to build their writing portfolios and prepare to submit their work for publication. Discussions of style, techniques, and the challenges involved in the publication process within this workshop-based approach encourage students to

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continue advancing their imaginative and literary skills. Additionally, students receive the opportunity to experience the "behind the scenes" of the publishing world by working on a literary journal from start to finish using Adobe InDesign.

- **ENG 125—Creative Writing I:** Students learn to craft and critique their own writing and the writing of peers in a workshop-based approach to the study and practice of writing techniques in fiction, poetry, and creative nonfiction.
- ENG 112—Writing/Research in the Disciplines: Building on skills developed in ENG 111, students further their research techniques, documentation styles, and writing strategies across three fields of study. Emphasis is placed on analyzing information and ideas, as well as incorporating research findings into documented writing and research projects. Students evaluate and synthesize information from primary and secondary sources using documentation appropriate to various disciplines, such as MLA, APA, and CSE.
- ENG 111—Writing and Inquiry (face-to-face and online): Students develop the ability to produce clear writing in a variety of genres and formats using a recursive process. Emphasis includes inquiry, analysis, effective use of rhetorical strategies, thesis development, audience awareness, and revision in the process of producing of unified, coherent, well-developed, and properly documented essays.
- DRE 097 & 098—Integrated Reading and Writing II & III: Students develop proficiency in integrated and contextualized reading and writing skills and strategies. Topics include reading and writing processes, critical thinking strategies, and recognition and composition of well-developed, coherent, and unified texts, as they apply these skills toward understanding a variety of texts at the career and college level.
