Topics may include imperialism, ideology, culture, economy, society, war, nationalism, gender, and decolonization. Prerequisites: None. Credit 3.

#### II. Statement of Need and Program Compatibility:

- a. \*Justify the need for the course: The proposed course, HSTY 3344 (Russian and Soviet Empires), will complement the department's existing strengths in the histories of politics, religion, and empire by focusing on these themes in the context of Soviet and European history. It will build on the foundation provided in HSTY 2312 (World History since 1500), as well as upper-division courses in early modern Europe, European religious history, and imperial history. Adding HSTY 3344 (Russian and Soviet Empires) will expand the department's curriculum by offering students a history course rooted in modern Russian and Soviet history and by providing students access to content on a region of the world of geopolitical significance. Providing student access to courses such as the proposed course allows students to meet the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board's core learning objectives (critical thinking skills, communication skills, empirical and quantitative skills, teamwork, personal responsibility, and social responsibility).
- b. \*Personnel Rotation Impact: This course will be added to the current rotation of upper-division electives and will be offered at least once every two years. Faculty will teach the course as part of their regular rotations. This course will replace a current course. The department has adequate faculty to teach the course; as such, it will not impact personnel rotations. As an elective course, it will not influence degree requirements.
- c. \*Similar Course Identification and Department Chair Approval: A search of the catalog yielded similar a similar course offered in the Department of Political Science (POLS 3361 Cent & Eastern European Politi). POLS 3361 asks students to evaluate the political systems of Central and Eastern European states. POLS 3361 does not ask students to use a historical analysis (an analysis of continuity and change over time through the evaluation of primary and secondary sources that is unique to the discipline of historical study), nor does it focus specifically on Russian and Soviet empires. A discussion with the Political Science department indicates they have no problem with the addition of the history course. See attached exchange.

#### **III. Course Content:**

#### Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. identify ideological and historiographical debates in the histories of the Russian and Soviet Empires and their successor states;
- 2. classify the area geographically, culturally, and politically within Eurasia;
- 3. analyze the ways in which the region changed over time;
- 4. articulate the major influences on the political economy of the Russian and Soviet Empires; and

5. evaluate different perspectives (the problems and appeals of monarchism, nationalism, democracy, socialism, capitalism, and fascism in the region's history) to critically analyze arguments.

Proposed Course Prefix and Number: HSTY 3344 Proposed Title: Russian and Soviet Empires

1. Results of the librarian's review of the adequacy of library holdings to support the proposed course content areas and assignments. This course will be supported with existing Library resources already available for multiple history classes covering the time frame and geographic location of the course. The geography aspect is also covered by materials available for geography courses. Searching for "Imperial Russia" and adding "expansion" yielded over 10,000 results. "Enlighted absolutism and Catherine" provided 697 results including books, articles, and more. "Yeltsin years" gave over 9,500 results. World War I and II are covered by other courses and have a multitude of existing resources.

Full-text scholarly journal articles are provided by JSTOR, OmniFile Full Text, Project MUSE, Humanities Source, and more. Primary sources are found with Gale Primary Sources, ProQuest collections in History, and more.

The Library's current journal holdings, monograph collection, electronic databases, and Interlibrary Loan services will sufficiently meet the needs of students enrolled in this course.

The Library will continue to add relevant materials over time as they are identified and as regular subject area funds permit.

#### VI. Writing Enhanced Supplement (Optional)

Proposed Course Prefix and Number: HSTY 3344 Proposed Title: Russian and Soviet Empires

Briefly explain hose the writing requirement will be met in this course, keeping in mind that 50% or more of the course grade must be derived from written assignments, either formal or informal.

75% of the course grade come from writing assignments. The assignments are broken down as follows:

- Reading reflections (10% of total course grade, informal)
  - o Two reflections over readings. 5% each
- Primary source analyses (15% of total course grade, formal)
  - Three short primary source analyses. 5% each
  - After the first primary source analysis, students are provided with instructor feedback to implement in each following analysis.
- Short essays (50% of total course grade, formal)
  - Two 3-to-5-page essays over marginalized communities (broadly defined) in the Russian and Soviet Empires. 25% each.
  - Students are provided with instructor feedback after the first essay to implement in the second essay

Reviewer's Notes: This course meets the requirements for a Writing Enhanced designation, as 75% of the course grade is comprised of writing activities, both informal and formal. Opportunities for feedback and revision are included for the first short essay; we recommend feedback be given on the second essay also (instructor or peer), using specific writing evaluation criteria/rubrics. The WID Committee is happy to provide any additional guidance or support. Sounds like an engaging course!
