TRANSCRIPTS

If you are in the process of completing your degree, submit a current transcript and a final one after you graduate. A transcript showing your degree and date awarded is required prior to enrollment.

The course load for a full-time graduate student is nine to twelve credit hours per fall or spring semester and six credit hours in the summer. Graduate students employed by the University at least half-time as graduate, research, or teaching assistants should enroll in a minimum of six graduate credit hours per semester. The maximum course load for graduate assistants on half-time employment is nine credit hours per fall or spring semester or six credit hours during the summer.

TYPES OF FINANCIAL AID

LOANS

A loan is financial assistance that enables you to borrow money from the federal government, state government, or private lenders that must be repaid. If you are non-degree seeking, you may only be eligible for alternative loans. Federal Direct Unsubsidized Loans and Federal Direct Graduate PLUS Loans are low-interest loans offered by the U.S. Department of Education based on the cost of attendance.

SCHOLARSHIPS

SHSU has a number of academic scholarships that are awarded for achievement in academics, leadership, and extracurricular activities. Most of these have a November 1st priority deadline. You may also contact your program advisor for additional program-specific scholarship information. The **Graduate Studies Scholarship** is intended for high-quality, new and current students. Students interested in this scholarship must be nominated by their graduate program advisor. See **shsu.edu/dept/graduate-studies** for details.

ASSISTANTSHIPS

Graduate assistantships are available in most departments. Some departments also offer teaching and research assistantships. If awarded an assistantship, you would receive a monthly stipend and may qualify for other benefits, including in-state tuition. For additional information about the availability of assistantships, contact your program advisor.

GRANTS

The most common grant available for graduate students is the TEACH Grant, which can help you pay for college if you plan to teach in a high need field in a low income area.

ELIGIBILITY

You must be a U.S. citizen or eligible noncitizen, regularly admitted without exception to an eligible graduate program, and enrolled in at least six hours.

HOW TO APPLY

Complete your FAFSA at **fafsa.ed.gov**. You do not need a graduate application on file with SHSU before completing the FAFSA. Priority is given to students who submit their FAFSA prior to **November 1** for the next academic year. The Title IV code for SHSU is **003606**.

Passion and fire light up the stage at SHSU where dance faculty provide students with exciting avenues for real world experience. NobleMotion Dance, founded by co-artistic directors Andy Noble and Dionne Sparkman Noble, creates works of challenging choreography, creative lighting and music choices, and breathtaking costume and set designs. Nicolay Dance Works, founded by artistic director Dana Nicolay, draws on elements from ballet, contemporary dance, and Laban Movement Analysis, to reanimate past works to elicit new meanings in modern times. Recked Productions, founded by Erin Reck, is a contemporary dance and production company known for creating reckless, raw, and inventive works.

PREVENTING CANCER IN TEXAS ASIAN POPULATIONS

Dr. Furjen Deng, professor and chair of the Department of Sociology, and her collaborators, Dr. Helen Sun of the Light and Salt Association and Dr. Lei-Shih Chen of Texas A&M University, established evidence-based programs designed to reduce the cancer disparity in Austin and Houston based Chinese American communities. Recently, Dr. Deng and her collaborators received a \$1.1 million expansion grant from the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas to establish a comprehensive cancer prevention and support program within Vietnamese, Korean and Filipino communities in Houston and Austin areas. UNDERSTANDING NUCLEAR NONPROLIFERATION

SOLVING SOLVENT ISSUES

Dr. Darren Williams's research in solvents led him to a \$150,000 grant from the Strategic Environmental Research and Development Program to generate new solvent blends to use for degreasing operations within the armed forces, NASA and the Department of Energy. Recently, Dr. Williams and his team collaborated with BFK Solutions LLC, out of California, to research azeotropic blends as suitable replacements for current solvents used in vapor degreasing. The CENTERS of EXCELLENCE



THE CENTER FOR EARLY MUSIC RESEARCH AND PERFORMANCE is dedicated to

embracing the past, present, and future of music through research, performance, and teaching while exploring applications of historical performance aesthetics in 21st-century musical cultures. The Center maintains an Italian organ in the style of a 17th-century organo di legno, specially built in 2015 by Giovanni Pradella.

THE CENTER FOR RURAL STUDIES addresses pertinent issues related to community and socioeconomic development in rural Texas. The Center, along with the Texas Cultural Trust, was awarded a \$15,000 National Endowment for the Arts Research

Grant to explore ways to stimulate rural community and economic development through the arts.





THE SOUTHEAST TEXAS APPLIED FORENSIC SCIENCE

FACILITY, one of only a few willed-body donor programs in the U.S., specializes in human decomposition research using state-of-the-art instruments to advance academic and technical knowledge in the application of multiple disciplines. Funded by the National Institute of Justice, STAFS recently collaborated with two other research centers to develop a standard quantitative method of the human decomposition process that can be used as scientific evidence in court cases.

THE CENTER FOR BIOLOGICAL FIELD STUDIES,

a 250-acre field station located about seven miles from the SHSU main campus, aims to serve as an institutional leader in ecology education, research, and environmental sustainability for the East Texas Piney Woods. Current research includes native bee biodiversity and plant-pollinator interactions, nesting behaviors of Carolina Wrens, western cottonmouth spatial behavior patterns, and insect diversity as a model for forensics.

THE CENTER OF INNOVATION AND TECHNOLOGY

develops robust solutions to current business problems by investigating, evaluating, and developing technologies, systems, and processes, providing practical research to customers and partners. The Center's Sower Business Technology Lab provides extensive hands-on learning opportunities in cuttingedge business technologies such as robotics, radio frequency identification (RFID), metrology and 3-D printing.



THE TEXAS INVASIVE SPECIES INSTITUTE, housed within the Texas Research Institute for Environmental Studies, is the first comprehensive effort in Texas focused on research and coordinating the effective early detection and rapid response to multiple new invasive species that currently impact, or have the potential to impact, ecosystems and produce major economic effects.

THE CENTER FOR THE STUDY OF DISASTERS &

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT is an interdisciplinary center that seeks to understand the social and physical processes associated with disasters and other emergencies. The center focuses on studying the wide variety of hazards that may potentially overwhelm organizational and societal capacities. Many of the center's research affiliates are actively engaged in training, volunteering, and consulting with local emergency management communities.

THE CENTER OF EXCELLENCE IN DIGITAL FORENSICS

regularly collaborates on high-profile, sensitive, and classified projects with private and governmental organizations—including the FBI, Sierra Nevada Corporations, InfraGard, and local and regional lawenforcement—to develop new approaches in the detection, preservation and analysis of digital evidence. The Center also provides databases to facilitate digital forensic profiling, digital fraud investigation and maintains software and hardware tools to improve data detection/recovery and network security.

Graduate Student RESEARCH

EXPLORING HUNTSVILLE'S WWII POW CAMP

As part of a seminar course, graduate students of the Master of Arts in History researched Camp Huntsville, which served as a POW camp during World War II. The resulting book, "The Enemy Within Never Did Without: German and Japanese Prisoners of War at Camp Huntsville, 1942-1945," is filled with personal accounts from both prisoners and guards from as far away as New Jersey and as close as Spring, Texas.

SELF-MANAGEMENT OF CHRONIC DISEASES

As part of the Health, MA internship requirement, Brandy Colvin has been hosting a weekly group meeting for veterans and others to discuss PTSD. Because veterans with PTSD have higher chances of suffering from chronic diseases like diabetes, heart disease, and chronic pain; she plans to incorporate Stanford's Chronic Disease Self-Management Program alongside the PTSD group therapy in an effort to improve the quality of life for veterans, dependents, and students across SHSU and the community.

USING AI IN EDUCATION

Doctoral students of the Instructional Technology, EdD program are collaborating with Dr. Donggil Song, assistant professor in the Department of Computer Science, to develop an intelligent conversational agent in online courses. His lab (einbrain.com) focuses on the use of artificial intelligence in education, learning analytics, and adaptive learning systems.

EXAMINING EATING DISORDERS TO UNDERSTAND PROGRAM EFFICACY

Clinical Psychology, MS student Ema Green is conducting research through the SHSU Youth & Family Studies Laboratory to examine SHSU students' reported exposure to high school eating disorder prevention and education programs. Her research aims to determine how school characteristics (e.g., size, location) relate to program implementation and college eating disorder behaviors.

ONLINE LITERARY JOURNAL SHARES GRADUATES' WORK

Graduate students of the English program founded the online literary journal *The Gordian Review*, as a resource for graduate students to present their fiction, poetry, and creative non-fiction works to the world. The journal's name is an allusion to the mythological Gordian knot, a puzzle of sorts designed to predict the next conqueror of Asia. "Sometimes, I think it's useful to think of art this way," says one of the founders, Alec Brewster, "as a puzzle with no definite answer presented by the artist for the reader to solve, to search out meaning from within the design." PROTECTING OUR NUCLEAR POWER

MS in Homeland Security Studies alumna Michael Coates is the cybersecurity project manager for the South Texas Project Nuclear Operating Company where he oversees the cybersecurity project for the STP Electric Generating Station, a 2,700-megawatt nuclear-powered facility providing clean energy to two million Texas homes. Coates also manages the multimillion-dollar project to implement the new regulations at his facility by December 2017.

QUANTIFYING HEALTH IMPACTS

After graduating with an MS in Statistics, Marley Boyd combined his passions for health and statistics into a career in the health care industry. He currently works as a biostatistician for McKesson Specialty Health, where he provides statistical support for health economics and outcomes research in the field of oncology.

Alumni CAREER OUTCOMES

ACHIEVING EXCELLENCE IN SCHOOL COUNSELING

Dr. Jana McLain, who received both her MEd in School Counseling and PhD in Counselor Education, has continued her success in the professional arena receiving the CREST award for counseling excellence from the Texas School Counseling Association for two consecutive years. Dr. McLain serves as the At-risk Counselor for Humble ISD's Community Learning Center, where she provides both small group and individual counseling, along with facilitating the mentor program and community outreach events.

RESEARCHING CANCER CONNECTIONS

After receiving her MS in Biology, with a minor in Mathematics, Damilola Omotajo went on to work as a Research Coordinator at the Baylor College of Medicine, where she biopsies tissues for future translational studies on the human gut development and cancer. Her thesis research focused on the translation within the bacterium, *Rhodobacter sphaeroides*, which led her to develop a mathematical model that predicts protein synthesis levels.

MAPPING THE BEST ROUTES

As a Maps Specialist with Uber, Asim Ayaz is building next generation maps for fully autonomous vehicles, including GIS mapping and analysis and 3D visualization. His graduate research within the MS in Geographic Information Systems included developing maps using ArcGIS and conducting crime analysis for the city of Houston. "The faculty at SHSU are very passionate about what they teach and that makes a huge difference," says Asim. "Studying there was a breath of fresh air."

PROGRAMS to help you SUCCEED

The Office of Graduate Studies enriches the graduate student experience by building a community between graduate learners and educators at the university.

WORKSHOPS

Presented in collaboration with Career Services, the **Resume/CV Writing Workshop** provides information and processes for creating an effective resume to fit your career goals.

Designed for those beginning their thesis/dissertation writing, the **Thesis/Dissertation Support Group** works as an accountability workshop designed to help attendees set and reach writing, research, and connection goals necessary for completion.

The Re-Boot Writing Day is available for any graduate student currently working on a capstone project, research paper, thesis/dissertation, or other project. Academic Success Center staff are available to meet individually with students to provide editing and writing tips.

A three-day intensive program, the **Dissertation Bootcamp** provides one-on-one assistance with research, writing, and statistics, along with dedicated writing blocks, for graduate students enrolled in any dissertation or proposal course.

ACHIEVEMENT PROGRAMS

The Graduate Studies Bridge to ASPIRE program provides first generation and minority graduate students with professional development, academic success seminars, and faculty mentoring experiences, along with cultural and educational activities, to help students succeed in their graduate education. All students selected for the program receive scholarships each semester as well as textbooks and other program incentives.

3 Minute Thesis (3MT), founded by The University of Queensland, is a competition that allows graduate students to present their thesis/dissertation research and its significance in just three minutes. 3MT challenges students to consolidate and concisely present their research and its importance to a non-specialist audience.

The Graduate Student Leadership Initiative is a student scholarship program to promote graduate student engagement and leadership development. Students must be elected to the executive leadership cabinet of a sanctioned Graduate Student Organization and must complete leadership trainings each fall and spring semester to qualify.

The Teaching Assistant Certification Series, a joint program between the Professional & Academic Center for Excellence and the Office of Graduate Studies, is available to graduate students interested in a career that will involve teaching. The series provides training in teaching, classroom management, and learning tools along with a stipend for those who complete the program.

the online Master of Arts in Higher Education Administration began after two years of service in the U.S. Air Force as a jet engine mechanic, which she completed before returning to finish her undergraduate degree. Cathrine says her decision to pursue the Higher Education Administration, MA degree online was prompted by her desire to secure a wellpaying job and be able to work while taking classes. "I was really surprised how fast I transitioned from classes on campus to online classes," says Cathrine. "The online courses have been almost the same as being in the classroom."
