<u>Course Description</u>: This course of faculty-led study is designed to provide undergraduate students exposure to new Economics topics and concepts in a course setting.

Note: This course will focus on international issues of importance to both China and the U.S. that will include the rise of China as an economic superpower; China and the world economy; the relationship between China and the world (including the U.S.) throughout history and in the 21st century. The class will comprise lectures by the instructor and invited speakers from the host institution and visits to historical and business sites

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- ii) explain and identify how greater economic and financial integration has enhanced the importance of coordination and cooperation among nations around the world at the same time as the global competition has increased.
- iii) communicate with Chinese students, scholars and businesses in a variety of cross-cultural experiences.

<u>Evaluation:</u> Grades will be based on participation in organized actives, participation and reflections, professionalism, and performance on four in-class exams and in-class presentations.

There will be three partial exams and each exam will count 20% of the student's final grade. There will be one final exam. The final exam is optional and it only counts to replace the lowest partial exam grade if the grade in the final exam is greater than the lowest partial exam grade.

The in-class presentations will be 20% of the final grade. Participation in class, attendance and professionalism will be 20% of the final grade. There is the possibility to assign additional extra credit assignment at the instructors' discretion.

<u>Course Description</u>: This course is the study of economic policy, institutions, firms, and consumer behavior of the host country in a study abroad program.

Prerequisite: 50 Completed Hours, ECON 2300 or ECON 2301 or ECON 2302, and

departmental approval.

Note: This course will focus on developing an understanding of Chinese business culture. Students will engage with other Chinese students in a variety of cross-cultural experiences, attend lectures from leading Chinese scholars, participate in field trips to historic sites and businesses in China, and learn about issues related to the modern Chinese economy.

<u>Learning Objectives</u>: Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- i) develop an understanding of modern Chinese culture.
- ii) identify how the Chinese cultural heritage has shaped modern China and its relationship with the current economic environment.
- iii) communicate with Chinese students, scholars and businesses in a variety of cross-cultural experiences

<u>Evaluation</u>: Grades will be based on participation in organized actives, participation and reflections, professionalism, and performance on three in-class exams and one presentation.

There will be three partial exams and each exam will count 10% of the student's final grade. The final exam is optional and it only counts to replace the lowest partial exam grade if the grade in the final exam is greater than the lowest partial exam grade. The presentation will be 20% of the final grade. Participation in organized activities and professionalism will be 50% of the final grade. There is the possibility to assign additional extra credit assignments at the instructors' discretion.
