1. The Capstone Course presenting the aforementioned skills will continue to be taught as it was this past academic year. New tests, as defined by the field, will be incorporated into the program. New protocols will be updated as needed. The nature of the capstone experience will continue to be evaluated. *This seems to have worked quite well*. 2. The faculty will continue with the year-end evaluations of all students in the Clinical Psychology Program and during the course of each semester. These evaluations will include ratings of professional characteristics and allow the faculty to comments on any particular strengths or weaknesses a particular student may have. Students with weaknesses will meet with the coordinator to discuss possible strategies to overcome any issues prior to their becoming real problems. *Since there appeared to be few weaknesses in our current cohort group taking capstone, the strategies we proposed in the last cycle seem to have worked*. 3. In the event that a remediation plan is needed, faculty in the MA in Clinical Psychology program will start those plans immediately and alter degree plans when a candidate's performance indicated a need for additional and/or specialized training. *No remediation plan was needed*. 4. During the semester in which the student is involved in the capstone experience, a mid-semester evaluation will be performed for each individual in the course. Extensive feedback on deficiencies from assessors will occur at this time. If need be, the student will be informed of the deficiencies and, if necessary, be placed on a remedial plan, or given extra training, or will be advised as to his or her probability of success in the program. *Mid-semester evaluations and constant feedback appears to have worked well*.

Update of Progress to the Previous Cycle's PCI:

In the upcoming academic year:

1. The Capstone Course presenting the aforementioned skills will continue to be taught as it was this past academic year. New tests, as defined by the field, will be incorporated into the program. As we have done in the past, new protocols will be updated as needed and the nature of the capstone experience will continue to be evaluated. As always, we will continue to stress ethical, legal, and moral issues and the proper professional procedures with our students when dealing with clientele.

2. The faculty will continue with the year-end evaluations of all students in the Clinical Psychology Program and during the course of each semester. These evaluations will include ratings of professional characteristics and allow the faculty to comments on any particular strengths or weaknesses a particular student may have. Students with weaknesses will meet with the coordinator to discuss possible strategies to overcome any issues prior to their becoming real problems.

Rather than merely looking at a percentage of students who pass the various portions of the Capstone, we shall look specifically at individual skills to determine if there are any weaknesses that might have been masked due to our only looking at the final outcome. This way, we can hone in on particular factors and improve our overall performance.
